

Venture Herringbone Stitch Scarf

The variegated nature of our Venture yarn lends itself perfectly to this striking herringbone stitch. This stitch is the perfect choice for someone new to knitting, who can confidently knit and purl and wants to try something new. We recommend working from two balls at once at alternating between rows to avoid colour pooling.

MEASUREMENTS

Width (approx)	cm	26
Length (approx)	cm	170
Yarn Required: Makr Venture (M)	100g balls	3
Makr Cosy (C1)	100g balls	1

Please use only the yarn specified. Another yarn is likely to yield different results. Quantities are approximate as knitting styles may vary between knitters. Check the ball bands to ensure all yarn is from the same dye lot.

ITEM A: Stitch and Fringing



DIFFICULTY •••

NEEDLES AND EQUIPMENT:

A pair of 4.00mm knitting needles. A 4.00mm crochet hook for fringing Wool needle for sewing in ends.

TENSION:

29 sts and 25 rows to 10cm over herringbone st, using 4.00mm needles.

KNITTING ABBREVIATIONS:

K: Knit Purl

P2tog: Purl 2 Together
Slip One Stitch purlwise

LN: Left Needle

SCARF

Casting on and edging:

Using 4.00mm needles and M, cast on 77 sts.

Work 1 row knit. Work 1 row purl

Herringbone Pattern:

Row 1 (RS): K2, *Sl1 knitwise, K1, inserting the LN into the slipped st lift it over the knitted stitch and back onto your LN, ins the right needle into the slipped stitch from right to left, knit it and pull off the needle. Repeat from * until last st, K1.

Row 2 (WS): K1, P1, *P2tog leaving stitches on needle, Purl the first st again and drop both sts from the LN, repeat from * to last st, K1.

Repeat these two rows until the piece measures 170cm from the beg, ending with a WS row.

Cast off:

Next Row (RS): *K2, pass the first st over the second st, repeat from to last st, K1, bind one off, cut tail and pull through the remaining stitch.

FINISHING

Weave in all ends and stretch gently into shape.

To add fringing to the scarf, begin by cutting equal lengths of C1. Fold three strands of yarn for one fringe, forming a loop at one end. Take your hook and ins the hook from the back of the work, draw the loop through the edge stitch of one end of the scarf. secure the fringing by pulling the ends of the yarn through the loop. Repeat this process on every alternate stitch until the end of the row. Repeat for the other end. You may comb out the yarn to create a fluffier fringe.
