Introduction

Thus far, we have established that Christians walk by faith (II Cor. 5:7), and we are to add certain characteristics to that faith. We trust in God to lead us (through His Word), and the Scriptures command that we grow (II Pet. 3:18). By studying II Pet. 1:5–10, we have discovered areas of growth to add to our lives, and that if we do this "ye shall never fall." Previously, we studied faith, virtue, knowledge, and temperance. Let's look at some other traits.

Additional Traits We Are to Add or Develop

- A. We must work diligently to add patience.
 - 1. Patience is a combination of endurance, persistence, and sometimes an element of longsuffering.
