



Elizabeth moved to Washington in 2010 to establish the D.C. office of software firm NIC. Prior to lobbying, Drew worked on the Hill for Senate leadership including Sen. Rick Santorum (R-Pa.) and Sen. Connie Mack (R-Fla.) In 2019, Drew was

Elizabeth is a vice president at GitHub, a software company that provides a platform that developers use to write code. Elizabeth joined GitHub in

2015 to start the company's public sector business. GitHub was acquired by Microsoft in 2018, and today Elizabeth has responsibility for the global public sector and Microsoft integration business units. Elizabeth was named one of the 2020 "Top Public Sector Leaders to Watch" by WashingtonExec, which cited her recent achievements in helping agencies leverage the GitHub platform to support pandemic-related work. This included helping the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention create GitHub repositories to host a national genomics consortium focused on sequencing COVID-19.

The family appreciates that Spring Valley is so pedestrian-friendly. Elizabeth and Drew both like to run, and, pre-COVID, Elizabeth often took Margaret to school at Spring Valley Montessori by bike. 

# Some Thoughts on Ways to Lessen Loneliness During the Holidays

With COVID-19 showing no sign of letting up its scourge on the world, many are left wondering if they might end up being alone for the holidays. Traditionally, the holidays have been a time for family and neighborly get-togethers. Unfortunately, the virus will interrupt the festivities just as it has upended everything else in our lives, here in Spring Valley and beyond.

Many of my older patients are considering whether it is worth the risk to fly to see their grandchildren or whether it is safe for their children's families to come to them. Many others have already decided that they will opt to stay home until there is a vaccine. While there are some guidelines from health experts, everyone must make these decisions based on their own comfort level.

Just how prevalent is loneliness due to the pandemic? One study from San Francisco found that 54 percent of older adults reported "worsened feelings of loneliness" due to Covid-19 (Kotwal et al., 2020). Our younger friends are not immune from these feelings of loneliness either. A study in the UK indicates that younger adults, those aged 18-24, are experiencing a

higher incidence of loneliness than any other age group (Groarke, et al., 2020). After all, this is the age range to explore new relationships at college or through professional connections. The pandemic has made this difficult, if not impossible, for many.

Since loneliness has been linked to high rates of dementia, depression, and even premature death, it is important to combat its negative impact. If you happen to be alone for the holidays, or any other time for that matter, there are some steps you might take.

#### **Find Creative Connections**

I realize technology is not for everyone, but there have been some leaps in recent years that make video calls and conferences easier. The response I often get with this suggestion is, "Well, it's better than nothing but not as good as the real thing." I agree. Still, "desperate times call for desperate measures," as the saying goes. Many recommend joining online forums in an area of interest. There are even quarantine dating sites. I would not have mentioned this last one except that a patient of mine found a good friend through one, and she talks with him regularly. Now is

also time to brush off any old postcards or stationery for someone who might be experiencing social isolation. A care package also would also brighten that person's day.

#### Find Meaning in the Separation

As author May Sarton said, "Loneliness is the poverty of self; solitude is the richness of self." Here in D.C., Iona Senior Services has launched 17 fitness classes, as well as book groups, current event groups, and technology workshops online. The Palisades Village also has many offerings such as Mindful Knitting, Storytelling, and Virtual Happy Hours. Finding purpose (or just distraction) in activities is one way to cope. Others are turning to creativity, either painting for the first time or returning to it. One patient of mine is working his way through the classic books he never got to.

These strategies are all imperfect, but loneliness is a dangerous byproduct of the pandemic. The truth is, everyone is different. What might work for one person might not for another. Please keep trying, as it is important to get through this difficult period without losing connection and meaning.

#### To Help Recently Incarcerated Women Take Charge of Their Lives

Spring Valley resident Daria Undeland, a 12th-grader at the Washington International School, contributed this story.

Last summer, when the MeToo and Black Lives Matter movements were gaining much-needed attention, I felt it was important to do something to make things better around me. I wanted to contribute to a gender-empowerment cause because I have always felt strongly about women's rights, dignity, and freedom from violence. So I became active in an organization that is making a real contribution to addressing these issues - Darnice's Place, a D.C. volunteer organization providing emotional and material support as well as basic life-skills training to empower recently incarcerated women to take charge of their lives.

Darnice's Place was set up through the vision, energy, and passion of an amazing woman, Christine Yates. Christine started this organization because of her volunteer work in the Department of Corrections and her

personal experience with a family member who used drugs and ended up as a prostitute. These events impacted her greatly because she realized many women go through serious unrecognized trauma that affects their lives. In addition, she would hear stories about jail molestation and many women leaving incarceration unprepared to lead a stable life who quickly ending up back in prison. She decided to start Darnice's Place to help these women and give them a chance to succeed.

I was immediately attracted to the organization because Christine brings a passion to support women in ways that will help get them back on their feet and integrate into the community. She does anything and everything for these women because she really cares! Christine goes with her beautiful, kind smile into prison twice a week to meet the women to give them hope, love, and sense of direction. She helps them build confidence and strength to aim for a better life. Many of these women need support from all of us to free themselves from

unhealthy choices and to get educational and life skills to help them build strong and resilient lives. Christine is an inspiration to me and many others!


Darnice's Place helps women through:

- · Conducting classes on parenting, life skills, referrals for job training and General Education Degree (GED) preparation
- Scheduling visits to treatment facilities, food banks, transitional housing
- · Paying or subsidizing rent, food, transportation, and job training courses
- · Helping reunite children with their mothers through legal procedures
- · Donating clothing, schoolbooks, furniture
- · Conducting Christmas Drives for gifts to children with incarcerated mothers
- · Helping write resumes and preparing for job interviews

I first started helping this organization through clothes donations. I sent out an announcement in my neighborhood, as well as at my parents' workplace. It was incredibly successful, as many people were eager to help out. The person would first text me, send me their location and preferred time for pickup, and then I would pick up the donations. I have received many clothes but have stopped the drive because of physical contact, and providing physical donations to women is paused due to COVID. At this moment Darnice's Place prefers financial contributions which can go to cover various costs for the women they serve.

Eventually, other local students from different schools have joined me in this cause: Alexandra Jimenez-Hope, Serene Kanj, and Nikka Boyle. They were all touched by the important issues Darnice's Place addresses and wanted to help in any way possible. Thus, we began a team of high-school students who felt that we can do something to help. We help by organizing donations and cataloguing needs of various help centers for housing, clothing,








# The Wilson Line to Mount Vernan









Today, as in the past, a boat makes the round-trip cruise on the Potomac River to George Washington's mansion. Now it is the Spirit of Mount Vernon, but once it was the Wilson Line.

While the George Washington Parkway is a faster way to reach Mount Vernon, the leisurely trip along the river has long offered a special kind of enjoyment that still attracts Washingtonians. For most Spring Valley and other area youngsters and their parents, the trip to Mount Vernon — by car or boat — has been a mandatory educational experience.

The stately mansion, in the Palladian style, is situated on a hill overlooking the Potomac River. George and Martha Washington are buried there. Surprisingly, despite the iconic property's exceptional historical value as the home of our first president, the mansion has never been owned by the federal government. Instead, it is held in trust by the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, who rescued it from ruin in 1858. During the Civil War, the mansion was treated as neutral ground, although the fighting was fierce nearby.

After its acquisition, the structure was restored. In recent years, the grounds have been enhanced with the restoration of surviving slave quarters, the construction of the new museum and education center, and the installation of a replica of the original distillery that existed on the property.

More than 60 years ago, the Wilson Line boat made the trip to Mount Vernon that the Spirit of Mount Vernon does today. Both have used piers on the Southwest Waterfront in the Washington Channel. The Waterfront provides the only nearby marina adjacent to the Potomac River that is south of the major city bridges crossing from Washington into Virginia. It is adjacent to Fort Leslie J. McNair, where the Army War College is located. A military reservation was first founded there in 1791, and it once held the conspirators in the assassination of Abraham Lincoln.

Today the recent Wharf high-rise development there makes the area almost unrecognizable to residents who took the Wilson Line in the past, and who remember the original Hogate's Restaurant and other long-time landmarks along the Waterfront. Still, the continued operation of the Spirit of Mount Vernon helps maintain a Washington tradition.

Even though the distance covered — approximately 15 miles — is actually quite modest, leaving from downtown Washington by boat affords the illusion of escape from everyday life and provides a sense of adventure. On the Virginia side, the cruise passes Old Town Alexandria and the Torpedo Factory (now an arts center). On the Maryland side, the boat goes by Fort Washington, which

was constructed to protect the city but was ultimately destroyed by its own garrison during a British advance in the War of 1812, when the British burned the White House in 1814.

In the past, Wilson Line passengers also had the option of stopping downstream at an amusement park called Marshall Hall. It was situated approximately across from Mount Vernon on the Maryland side. The amusement park was built on land that had been part of a plantation, Marshall Hall, which operated from the mid-1700s until it was sold in 1867. A few ruins and structures remain in Piscataway Park, owned by the National Park Service. The Park features the National Colonial Farm.

In 1889, the plantation land was purchased by the Mount Vernon and Marshall Hall Steamboat Company, which served Washington and Alexandria, along with Mount Vernon and Marshall Hall. To enhance revenue, the steamboat company developed a small amusement park at Marshall Hall in the mid-1890s. Boats stopped at the park twice a day.


The Wilson Line purchased the park in 1954. The amusements at Marshall Hall included a swimming pool, skating rink, Ferris wheel, carousel, and roller coaster. In 1958 the adult entertainment was enhanced with the addition of Happyland, which featured a snack bar, cocktail bar, and gambling hall for slot machines, which were then legal in Charles County. A picnic pavilion was also built.

Marshall Hall Amusement Park, like Glen Echo Amusement Park on the north side of Washington, was popular in the era before regional parks, like King's Dominion and Six Flags, captured the area market, and before the Disney properties drew a national audience. Both local parks were served by public transportation: Visitors could travel to Marshall Hall by boat or to Glen Echo by trolley car. Baby-boomer memories were made at these places.

In 1969, the park was sold to Joseph Goldstein, who proposed to develop a mega-park there on the scale of Disney World. When he started cutting trees along the shoreline, thus disturbing the historic view from Mount Vernon, the National Park Service bought the property from Goldstein, allowing him to continue operating the existing amusement park until 1980. By then, market changes had long since eclipsed its popular appeal. After the park closed, all the amusements were torn down.

During its heyday, the Wilson line was the scene of an early moment in rock-and-roll history. None other than The King, Elvis Pressley, was booked for the moonlight cruise the night of March 23, 1956. It turned out to be the one and only time he played D.C. during his whole career

Unfortunately, the boat never sailed! The trip was billed as the early spring kickoff of the season of Country Music Moonlight Cruises. The weather was windy and cold, and the boat had sustained a broken valve that the crew could not repair. Many people clamored for the refund of their two-dollar fare — and received it. But the show went on. Those who stayed were entertained on board at dockside for three hours by Elvis and other acts.


For the occasion, Elvis tried out some new material, including "Heartbreak Hotel" and "Blue Suede Shoes." Many fans of country music were largely unaware of Elvis at this point in his career, and many of those who had heard him on records or earlier on a 1954 Grand Ole' Opry broadcast were not convinced his sound was even genuine country music.


Ahead in September was to be his first, sensational appearance on The Ed Sullivan television show. 1956 would be his national breakthrough year, with other hits as well, like "I Want You, I Need You, I Love You," "Hound Dog," "Love Me Tender," "All


Shook Up," and "Teddy Bear." In December of that year, Elvis joined Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, and Johnny Cash — the so-called Million Dollar Quartet — in the Sun Records studio in Memphis for a now-famous session.

Before the hour of the doomed cruise and show on March 23, Presley made an appearance at the Evening Star Television Center at Connecticut Avenue near Van Ness Street for a TV interview during WMAL-TV's *Town and Country Time*. The host was a 27-year-old country singer named Jimmy Dean, better known today for the sausage company that still bears his name. Elvis later claimed to be intimidated by television at that time and gave an unresponsive interview. Years later Elvis Presley and Jimmy Dean appeared together on some bills in Las Vegas.

The contrast is nothing less than striking between the D.C. reception received by the then-unknown future sensation, Elvis, on the Wilson Line and the screaming, fan-mobbed arrival of The Beatles in 1964 for their first U.S. appearance, here at the Washington Coliseum.

- 1 cup cold milk
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup cracked ice
- · 2 cups vanilla ice cream
- ¾ cup water
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- Pinch of nutmeg
- Peppermint sticks

Combine egg, sugar, salt, milk, and vanilla extract in a large mixing bowl. Using a rotary beater, whip until well combined and the eggs thicken, about 3 minutes. Transfer the beaten mixture to a blender. Add cracked ice, ice cream, water, ground cinnamon, and nutmeg. Pulse until smooth. Garnish with a peppermint stick


