Paper the Pantry

"I love to add wallpaper in unexpected places," said New York interior designer Fawn Galli, who was forced to scrap plans for a pantry with built-in cabinetry due to budget. "Bold floral paper under open shelving ended up being much more powerful and punchy. Sometimes value engineering can work out in your favor."
