Study Sheet Design

1. Cumulative word lists

The readers are best read in numerical order because there is a strong emphasis on the development of a cumulative vocabulary. For example, new words introduced in Book 1.4 will be practised in Book 1.5, 1.6 and so on. This practice is especially important for the learning of irregular words as these words present the most difficulties for beginning readers. This cumulative vocabulary is explicitly organised in the worksheet words lists under the headings 'New words' and 'Revise'.

- 2. The worksheet activities are separated into three sections: regular words only, sight words only and regular and sight words together.
- 3. **Handwriting** exercises

Trace and/or copy

- single letters
- words
- sentences
- 4. **Reading** is embedded in many activities, rather than just reading the list of words. For example, a student may complete a proofreading exercise and then READ the completed sentences to a partner.
 - Most worksheet exercises require the student to constantly READ the words and sentences that occur in the decodable reader.
- 5. The **lists** of regular and irregular words provided in each set of study sheets may be used to practise or revise the reading of new words; to maintain previous learning and/or to monitor individual student progress.
- 6. **Comprehension** activities include sequencing, cloze exercises, word meanings, read and draw, etc. The order of difficulty increases over time, e.g., visual match, selection, production.
- 7. **Word study** includes word meanings, synonyms, antonyms, compound words, and morphology (word building).
