## Useful Spelling Rules

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## Introduction

It is a popular misconception that the English language is a highly irregular language, one which largely defies rules and conventions. While many languages are, certainly, more predictable than English it remains true that at least $80 \%$ of the language conforms to some rule or structural group.

Learning about spelling rules and spelling conventions has a number of benefits.
First, it allows children to generalise spelling skills to new words. For example, if a student learns that 'busy' becomes 'busied' using the rule: 'change the ' $y$ ' to an 'i' before adding a vowel ending', then the student has a good chance of getting the spelling of 'carry' - 'carried' correct even if it has not been explicitly taught.

It encourages the analysis of words. This analysis ensures that students 'know' about a word in more ways than they would do in a whole-word approach, which is an ineffective method of ensuring that information is learned and stored in long term memory..

It reduces apparent chaos. For example, if 'dry'-'dried' is correct, is 'play'-'played' an exception? (No, just add the vowel ending when the ' $y$ ' in the base word is preceded by a vowel.)

The teaching of rules is about the teaching of guidelines that assist the spelling of unfamiliar words. There are always exceptions to rules. Teach the rule and be happy when a student finds the exception! This means that they are thinking!
