Christina Rossetti (1830 - 1894) wrote the poem *In the Bleak Midwinter* first published as *A Christmas Carol* in *Scribner's Monthly* (January, 1872). At least ten composers have created music to her words, the most famous of whom was perhaps Gustav Holst (1874 - 1934) whose setting was published as CRANHAM in the English Hymnal of 1906. (Cranham is a residential area in east London.)

The theology of Rossetti's text has, on occasion, been questioned in terms of its appropriateness for inclusion in a hymn. The first verse, for example, makes no mention of God or Christ, though from there the poem takes on and carries its sacred intention to the end.

This purely instrumental setting, based on Holst's lovely tune, reflects primarily the words of Rossetti's first verse:

In the bleak midwinter
Frosty wind made moan,
Earth stood hard as iron,
Water like a stone;
Snow had fallen, snow on snow,
Snow on snow,
In the bleak midwinter
Long ago.
