- 3. Diabetic dogs, like humans, have an overworked pancreas. This is the organ that makes insulin to break down sugar. (The pancreas also makes enzymes that break down fat). So, to help the pancreas along, it is a good idea to keep off fats when planning out your dog's daily diabetic meal plan.
- 4. Put you diabetic dog on lean meats, like chicken once in a week or once a month. Vegetables should form a good part of the dogs diet. So, get some fresh green vegetables and mix them in the diabetic dog food twice a week.

These tips coupled with lots of TLC (tender, loving care) are among the best things you can do for your ailing pet.

Prescription-Strength Diabetic Dog Food

Once your dog has been diagnosed with diabetes, your vet will make some changes right away to your dog's care. One of the first changes will be to what you dog eats. In all probability, your vet will recommend a brand of food made just for dogs with diabetes...with a catch. Either your vet will sell it to you him or herself, or, more likely, give you a prescription for the dog food. But what is this with needing a prescription just to buy diabetic dog food.

Because your dog is having difficulty managing their blood sugar, modifying the mix of nutrients your dog eats will go a long way to helping your dog's body to balance out this sugar level. Specially-formulated meals will accomplish just that. A prescription or therapeutic diet is one prescribed by a veterinarian to adjust a medical condition.

Commercial diabetic dog foods are formulated to target the unique metabolic processes of a dog with diabetes. The mixture and ratio of nutrients (proteins, starch, fiber, vitamins, etc.) in these specially formulated meals are different than general brands of dog food. This special mix should help the bodily functions of a pooch with diabetes adjust to stable levels, functions like blood glucose levels, digestion, immune system responses and kidney functions.

Commercial dog food companies create their special diabetic dietary mixes based on scientific research that determines the best ratios of various nutrients that a diabetic dog needs. When doing this, some nutrients are reduced and some are elevated in amounts that are outside the typical levels that are good for normal dogs. Put another way--foods that are made especially to control irregular blood sugar in diabetic dogs are are not appropriate for normal dogs.

Therefore, food products specifically for diabetic dogs typically are available for purchase ONLY on the order of a licensed veterinarian.

Therefore, prior to feeding any dog a diet specifically formulated to modify body chemistry-in this case blood sugar levels--a veterinarian must make an appropriate medical diagnosis. After that they then can write a prescription for special food. Think of therapeutic diets as you would a drug (even though there are not actually drugs in them!). This food has a special mix designed to produce a specific reaction (like a drug). And only dogs that have been diagnosed with diabetes should be eating diabetic dog foods.

Diabetic Dog Care - Exercises For Diabetic Dogs

Diabetic dog care should include regular exercises for diabetic dogs so that you can achieve optimum health. By implementing a well-balanced healthy nutritious diet and a good regular exercise routine you will be able to effectively manage your diabetic dog's health.

It is very important for a diabetic dog to get regular exercise for the following reasons:

- Weight Control If your dog has diabetes it is essential to maintain weight control. When more weight is gained managing the diabetes is made a lot harder. Controlling the weight of your dog will help manage blood sugar levels so that they remain at a normal level
- Blood circulation Making sure that your dog gets better blood circulation is
 essential. Exercise will usually cause the blood glucose to decrease when the muscles
 pull the energy from the blood glucose. Therefore when your dog exercises, the blood
 glucose decreases and allows absorption of insulin to work better which causes the
 blood glucose to lower. This means that exercise will increase the rate at which
 insulin is absorbed
- Weight Loss Weight loss will help to lower high blood glucose levels, so getting regular exercise and eating a well-balanced healthy nutritious diet will benefit your diabetic dog with any weight problems

Before implementing any exercise program for your dog, it is advisable to consult with your vet to make sure which exercises will be more beneficial to your dog and will cause the least amount of harm. The type of exercise you choose for your diabetic dog should be an activity that is enjoyable and fun. Make sure you determine these exercises with your dog's health condition and age in mind.

You should never over exert your diabetic dog with exercise, keep it easy and fun, you should make sure that your dog does not end up panting. Always ensure that you have fresh water on hand at all times. When you are out and about, make sure to take a sweetener like Karo syrup with you just in case you dog requires something if the blood sugar levels become low. If you notice that your dog shows signs of dizziness, fatigue or convulsions, simply give your dog a little sugar and you should notice the change instantly.

When you implement your exercise program for your dog, make sure to start off slowly, keep it to 10 to 15 minutes each time, and increase this over time and depending on how your dog reacts to the exercise program. Try to exercise at the same time each day as well as the same amount of time; this will help your diabetic dog as dramatic changes will cause high blood glucose levels and can only harm your dog.

Diabetic dog care is not complicated and can be implemented easily. Exercises for diabetic dogs as well as a healthy nutritious diet is vital in managing diabetes and achieving optimum health.

Signs of Diabetes in Dogs and Feeding Instructions For a Diabetic Dog

Just like humans, dogs are also caught by diabetes. If your dog is also experiencing signs of diabetes then the best way to keep his diabetic condition in control is diabetic dog food. Following things must be monitored to control the signs of diabetes in dogs

- Quantity of sugar
- Amount of carbohydrates
- Amount of food
- Frequency of feeding

It is generally recommended that diabetic dog should be given smaller meals three times a day instead of one large meal. The blood sugar levels can be stabilized with the help of smaller meals. One single large meal causes the formation of peaks and valleys of blood sugar level. The low blood sugar level may result in hypoglycemia which is a serious condition.

What should the owner feed to diabetic dog? Here are few recommendations for the owners whose dogs are suffering from signs of diabetes.

Avoid Sugary Foods: Most owners of dog are unaware of the amount of carbohydrates and sugar content of the commercial dog foods. Carbohydrates are metabolized into glucose in the body so they are considered a type of sugar. Both dry dog foods and softly moist dog foods are not good for the diabetic dogs. It is better to feed it with canned food after thoroughly checking the ingredients printed on label.

Homemade Diabetic Dog Food: The best solution for diabetic dog food is raw food or homemade dog foods. The dog owner is in a better position if keeping the track of quantity of sugar and carbohydrates being fed to dog. Homemade dog foods are expensive and require much patience but there are many websites that can be helpful in preparing tasty and nutritious dog food at home.

Reduce the Amount Of Fats: The function of pancreas is to control the amount of insulin and blood sugar and produce enzymes to break down the fat content of food. The aim of the diabetic dog food is to put least stress on pancreas so low fat meat is the better choice. Extra fats in turkey and cheeks must be removed. Ground beef must be avoided.

Small Amount of Grains Are Good: The dog owner must be careful about the quantity of grains; as animals cannot digest grains easily like humans. Still few grains are favorable for the diabetic dogs. Oats, millet and brown rice are good sources of dietary fiber.

Handling Diabetic Dogs

Many people don't know that diabetes can affect animals and they are shocked when their pet is diagnosed with diabetes. Luckily diabetes can be managed in pets but there are a few things you will have to do to maintain your pet's health. Dogs can live a normal lifespan with diabetes but they need supportive care, here are a few steps you can take to support your diabetic dog:

- 1. Try to find a veterinarian who is specialized in working with diabetic dogs. While there is no cure for diabetes, proper care and management can allow your dog to live a long and happy life.
- 2. Learn how to administer insulin injections to your dog. Oral diabetes medication isn't very successful in dogs and your diabetic dog will need insulin shots. Fortunately the process is easy and once your veterinarian has determined the correct dosage of insulin your dog needs, learning how to administer the shot is easy and relatively painless for your dog. Insulin shots are given in the scruff of the animal's neck and the needle is thin and painless.
- 3. You will have to learn how to collect a urine sample from your dog on a regular basis to test for glucose levels in order to monitor your dog's glucose levels. This can be easily done using a pie pan to collect urine and then using a glucose strip to measure the amount of glucose present in the urine. Frequent monitoring is necessary in case you have to readjust insulin doses.
- 4. Feeding your dog an appropriate diet is crucial in managing canine diabetes and a high fiber diet is the most beneficial in this case. Treats should be minimized or ruled out and anything that can negatively affect your dog should be eliminated from your dog's diet. Diabetic dogs learn to find food easily so care should be taken not to leave food lying around or within access of your pet.
- 5. You should walk your dog on a daily basis. Exercise is very beneficial for diabetics, both canine and human!

- 6. Talk with your vet to see if there are any vitamin and mineral supplementation your dog may benefit from.
- 7. Monitor your dog's water intake and behavior. If your dog's urination increases or he seems particularly thirsty you should report this to your vet immediately. Your vet may decide to administer a blood and urine test to monitor any changes in blood sugar levels and adjust medication accordingly.
- 8. As diabetic dogs are prone to fainting when blood sugar levels decrease suddenly, always keep some corn syrup or honey close at hand. If your dog faints or goes into shock, place a few drops of corn syrup or honey on the dog's gum and tongue to revive him and take him to the vet immediately.

Are Insulin Injections the Only Answer For Your Diabetic Dog?

There are natural ways to treat and help your diabetic dog but the fact still remains, if they need insulin, then insulin they must have. But even if this is the only answer you can still considerably reduce the amount of insulin to be administered along with improving your dog's health and well being.

Diet.

It goes without saying that sugar needs to be reduced or cut out completely. But although it is pretty easy to recognize sugar or glucose within foodstuffs, it isn't so obvious to recognize the other big culprit for diabetic mayhem - carbohydrates. Most dry dog foods, including the prescription diets your vet sells, are predominately made from grains. The problem with grains is that they're usually very high in carbohydrates, which you and your dog's body quickly turns into glucose thus producing a spike in blood sugar levels.

If you think of the principle of the Atkins diet with the cutting out of carbs, you can begin to understand what happens when you or your dog consumes carbs. Carbs = sugar = weight gain (sometimes diabetes). Both simple and complex carbs produce glucose but they are released into the blood stream at different speeds. Simple being quick, complex being slow. Generally they are OK for your energy levels but the over-consumption of carbs has probably been the leading cause of obesity and diabetes in both humans and dogs. In times gone by before the modern medical marvels of treating diabetes if someone became diabetic it was unlikely they would live past 30. But the doctors of old recommended a diet of protein and fat with no carbs or sugar (fruit), perhaps you could say those doctors of a couple of hundred years ago

began the Atkins diet! The best way to regulate the glucose being released into the bloodstream is to prolong the digestion process with a diet higher in protein and fat. In the case of your diabetic dog perhaps try a good quality canned food or better still a homemade diet.

Exercise.

Any good diabetic will tell you that exercise does wonders for their condition. Getting the blood pumping helps shift that excess weight and helps regulate your blood sugar levels. The fatter you are, the more difficult it is to keep good sugar levels and control. Diabetes is all about good control. The only thing to be mindful of is that exercise will burn your sugar up so beware of the hypo. The same applies to your dog, give him as much exercise as possible but have something on hand should he show symptoms of a hypo. With this in mind perhaps you should work out an exercise plan with your vet.

Your vet will tell you that consistency is the key and will probably suggest that you exercise your pet at the same time every day keeping the sessions the same length without being overvigorous; you do not want your dog getting out of breath as he could be on the way to having a hypo. If your dog goes dizzy or weak or starts to act in an unusual way, give him something sweet and get to the vet quickly.

Natural Remedies

Many studies have shown that certain herbs, vitamins, nutrients and minerals can be helpful in regulating blood glucose levels in a diabetic dog. These include:

Fenugreek: helps to slow down carbohydrate absorption and may stimulate insulin production.

Astragalus: is often used in Chinese Medicine. Clinical research has proven its effectiveness to regulate glucose levels and it can also prevent or slow the formation of cataracts, which are almost a guaranteed effect of canine diabetes.

Goat's rue can lower glucose levels without causing hypoglycaemia (hypo) and may also reduce your dog's risk of cataracts, and may also prevent kidney damage.

Bilberry is another cataract preventing favourite with herbalists with some even believing Bilberry can reverse them.

Chromium is an essential mineral for glucose regulation in the blood. Popular with humans in supplement form, it is also an excellent product for your diabetic dog. It can prevent insulin resistance, which is usually a precursor of type 2 diabetes which is the most common form of this disease among canines and humans.

All the above are fine to use along with insulin but some owners wish to pursue this herbal direction to a point where their pet is no longer insulin dependent. This is a great goal but consult with your vet before making any major changes. Remember mainstream vets are not

champions of any alternative remedies or medicines, so make sure your vet is forward rather than backward thinking.

Diabetes is a horrible aging disease but with good blood sugar control for you or your dog it will mean a virtually normal and happy existence.

Tips For Living With Your Diabetic Dog

If you have a diabetic dog, life is probably a bit more complicated for you and your pet than it used to be. Canine diabetes can be a challenging condition to manage, but it can be done. Here are some tips to make life easier for both of you.

Is Exercise A Good Idea For Dogs With Diabetes?

Yes, it is, but you do need to be careful. Too much exercise can cause your pet's blood sugar levels to drop to dangerously low levels. It's always a good idea to keep a little Karo syrup with you so you can rub it on your pet's gums if he starts showing signs of hypoglycemia.

It's essential to be establish a consistent routine for exercise. You'll need to commit to exercising him every day at about the same time, for about the same amount of time each day. Avoid having him out running around at top speed for a half hour once or twice a week, and then sitting around the rest of the time.

A daily ten-minute walk can help considerably in keeping your pet's blood glucose regulated. Low-key activities, where your pet doesn't start panting, are best. Walking or swimming are recommended exercises for a diabetic pet.

Always consult with your vet before starting an exercise program for dogs with diabetes.

What Should I Be Feeding My Diabetic Dog?

You need to understand that most dry dog food contains too many carbohydrates. The problem is that carbohydrates are quickly broken down into glucose, which is dumped into his system all at once. This causes a spike in his glucose levels. A pet with diabetes either isn't producing enough insulin to regulate these levels, or his body can't use it. When glucose levels remain high for a long time, it causes damage to just about every organ in your pet's body.

Learn to read pet food labels. You'll probably be surprised to learn that even the dry prescription diet your vet recommends contains too many carbohydrates for dogs with diabetes.

You'll want to feed your pet a high-quality grain-free food. Canned food is probably best, although there are dry foods available now that are grain-free. Look for a food that's high in fiber, and low in fat. Protein and fat are also broken down into glucose, but it's released into your pet's body over a much longer period of time, which avoids those nasty spikes in blood sugar levels.

You'll be feeding your pet two or three small meals a day instead of one big one. This also helps to regulate glucose levels in his blood.

Are Natural Remedies For Dogs Safe For Pets With Canine Diabetes?

Some pet owners are interested in using herbs and dietary supplements to regulate glucose levels naturally. Research has shown that the herbs goat's rue, fenugreek, and astragalus, along with the mineral chromium, are very effective in controlling blood sugar levels in pets. These remedies are safe to use in combination with the insulin prescribed by your vet.

Always consult with your vet before making any treatment changes. Most vets are very open to the use of natural remedies, and will be willing to work with you and your companion. It's important that your vet monitors your pet to be sure he doesn't develop hypoglycemia. It may be necessary to lower the insulin dose when using natural remedies for dogs.

Do yourself and your diabetic dog a favor and try a natural pet remedy today. Life may become less challenging for both of you.

The Implications of a Diabetic Dog

It's shocking to hear that your dog has been diagnosed with diabetes, but it doesn't mean an end to her life. Proper diet and insulin treatment can ensure her several more years with a good quality of life. Follow these steps when your family finds itself caring for a diabetic dog.

Step 1: Enlist the help of a qualified veterinarian who has experience working with dogs that suffer from diabetes. Unfortunately, the battle with diabetes can be long and trying and requires the expertise and patience of a worthy vet.

- Step 2: Become familiar with injecting insulin into your dog's scruff. Your vet will help you in determining the right amount of insulin, but as the pet owner, you will be responsible for administering the insulin at least once a day.
- Step 3: Become adept at chasing your dog around with a pie pan in order to intercept her stream of urine. On a very frequent basis you will need to collect her urine sample and dip a glucose strip into the urine in order to perform the glucose strip test, which determines glucose levels.
- Step 4: Feed your dog a high fiber quality dog food that your vet recommends. Diet is of utmost importance to a diabetic dog and it's vital that you are strict about your dog's food intake. Also eliminate all treats from your dog's diet. This is not negotiable. Take care not to leave any food on counters or in accessible trashcans as diabetic dogs will become very clever at finding foods they are not allowed to eat.
- Step 5: Initiate an exercise program immediately. In order to improve the quality of her life, your dog should walk at least 5 days a week.
- Step 6: Research dietary supplements (such as vitamins or minerals) that your pup might benefit from. Consult with your vet before introducing supplements into your dog's health routine.
- Step 7: Pay attention to any changes in your dog's urination, water intake, behavior, etc. Report these changes to your vet and be willing to have your dog participate in regular urine and blood tests.
- Step 8: Always have corn syrup on hand. If your diabetic dog goes into shock, just a few drops of this sticky substance on her tongue should stabilize her for the time being.
