Lesson 1	To be able to locate the local area on a map and to give directions.	Children will locate the UK on a world map before looking at a map of the UK to identify different regions. They will use Ordnance Survey maps to identify how the UK is split into a grid, identifying different towns and counties within each square. Lesson 2	To learn about physical and human features of our local area.	Children will identify a variety of human and physical features. They will consider the difference between rural and urban areas and identify whether they live in a rural or urban area. Lesson 3	To identify different types of services in the local area.	Children will think about services which are common to most towns and consider which are most important. They will identify a variety of different services in their local area. Lesson 4	To be able to collect and record evidence.	Children will gather data to find out ways in which adults in their local communities get to work. They will record the evidence they have gathered and present it in an appropriate way. They will describe the area they live in, giving details about its human and physical features.
