Lesson 1	To read and explore the poem.	This initial lesson allows the children to listen to and explore the poem 'Jabberwocky' by Lewis Carroll. They will find out a little about the poet before being challenged to retrieve information about the characters and story of the poem. Lesson 2	To explore word classes in the poem.	This lesson challenges your class to identify the word class of some of the nonsense words in the poem. The children are reminded of the definitions of the basic words classes before trying to figure out what kind of word 'slithy' fits into.	 Can children identify nouns, verbs and adjectives in a regular sentence? Are children able to identify nouns in a nonsense sentence? Are children able to identify adjectives and verbs in a nonsense sentence? Lesson 3	To explore portmanteau and nonsense words in the poem.	This lesson explores the nonsense words that Carroll created for his poem, focusing on the portmanteaus created from the meanings of two other words. The children can investigate the portmanteaus in the poem, or create their own to use.	 Do the children know what a portmanteau is? Can the children come up with a definition of a portmanteau? Lesson 4	To explore the imagery and atmosphere created in the poem.	This lesson looks at the imagery created in the poem. The children will create their own interpretations of the creatures and settings that they imagine when reading the poem.	Can children discuss the effect the poem has on them? Are children able to pick out language that has created a mood or image? Are children able to create an artistic representation of the imagery from the poem? Lesson 5	To investigate poetic structure and devices in the poem.	This lesson focuses in on the technical ingredients that are included in the poem 'Jabberwocky'. The children will discuss the structure and poetic features used in the poem in order to generate a success criteria to create a poem like 'Jabberwocky'.	 Can children identify simple structural features of the poem? Are children able to identify poetic features in the poem? Lesson 6	To plan out our own version of 'Jabberwocky'.	Prepare your class as they plan out their ideas for their own version of 'Jabberwocky'. The children will use what they have learnt about the 'ingredients' of the poem and use this understanding to generate ideas for their own poem.	Can children identify important features of the poem to include in their own version of 'Jabberwocky'? Are children able to identify key themes and storylines in the poem to include in their own version of 'Jabberwocky'? Can children make suggestions and/or improve upon a shared write? Lesson 7	To write our own version of 'Jabberwocky'.	Your class will embody Carroll in this final lesson as they create their own version of the poem 'Jabberwocky'. They will create their own success criteria and use the features of the poem they have studied to add to their own writing.	 Can children identify the different elements of a poem that contribute to the style? Can children follow a plan for their story/nonsense poem?
