| Lesson | To understand what biodiversity is and why it is important   | In this first lesson, children will learn what biodiversity is, and how important it is not only for plants and animals, but for humans too. They will explore the biodiversity of one of the largest ecosystems in the world - the coral reef. In their independent activities, children will create their own coral reef, and then complete sentences or answer questions about it. | Lesson | To know what extinction is and how this affects biodiversity | In this lesson, children will focus on rainforests, and will begin to learn about this ecosystem by exploring some simple food chains that can be found there. They will find out what extinction is, and how this is a threat to the biodiversity of the rainforest by exploring its possible effect on food chains. In their independent activities, children will further explore and discuss the effect of extinction on different plants and animals. | Lesson | To understand the important role birds play in biodiversity  | Children will find out about the important role birds play in many of the world's ecosystems. They will be encouraged to think about what the world would be like without birds. They will discover that the bird population is declining, and will talk about some small ways in which they could help the birds that visit their garden. In their independent activities, children will design and make a bird feeder.
