Lesson 3	To explore where the Windrush generation are today.	This lesson looks on the Windrush generation today and touches on the scandal that happened in 2018. Lesson 4	To explore the impact that the Windrush generation has had on Britain.	Children will discuss the impacts that they think the Windrush generation had on Britain at the time and now.
