

century and more

after his death. the writings of one of the most prominent evangelical bishops of the 19th century are still read by Christians of all denominations. His devotional commentaries Expository Thoughts on the Gospels, the practical books like Knots Untied or Holiness. and his historical biographies like Five English Reformers and Christian Leaders of the 18th Century are valued resources for those who want to deepen their faith. Ryle was not a dry, stuffy theologian who cannot be understood. but someone who wrote with great clarity and practical application—and who made difficult theological ideas easy to grasp. Ryle was always biblical (he took scripture seriously), evangelical (he wanted people to became committed Christians), protestant (he fully endorsed the theological issues of the 16th century Reformation), and he was a Puritan (he loved and honoured the 17th century Puritans). Ryle was also an Anglican who believed in the

value of the established Church in the life of the nation. Over the past 150 years 'Bishop Ryle', or 'I C Ryle' as he is better known, has helped thousands of people to come to faith in Christ and to mature as Christian believers. Ryle was a Church of England clergyman who lived for thirtysix years in rural Suffolk. During that time he wrote some 200 popular tracts, published books, preached in numerous churches, and spoke at national conferences and public meetings. As the first Bishop of Liverpool he was responsible for creating new diocesan structures, the opening of numerous churches and mission rooms, and the ordination and appointment of additional clergy. In this Travel Guide we take you in the steps of I C Ryle and throw some fresh light into his life, belief and personal convictions.
