
What is Card Making? Everything You Need to Know About This Popular Paper Crafting Hobby

Now, greeting cards are a very common occurrence. People especially appreciate that handmade cards offer a special, more thoughtful touch.




Basic Card Making Supplies and Card Making Ideas

Inks for stamping come in a wide range of colors. This allows card makers to make cards in many different color palettes, designs, and themes. Many card makers use stamping as the central point of their card. They may stamp a large floral image in the center of the card, color it in with their favorite coloring mediums, and then add a sentiment relevant to the card's purpose somewhere on top or on the side.



Another popular product to use in cardmaking tutorials is the category of **dies for paper crafting**. These, too, come in different forms - **coordinating dies**, **sentiment dies**, **cover dies** and **standalone dies**. With crafting dies, card makers are able to quickly and efficiently cut out beautiful designs with a **die cutting machine** that they can add to their cards. This helps avoid the difficult and monotonous experience of fussy cutting, especially when there are lots of tiny details to cut. Dies that coordinate with **stamps** are especially popular, as they allow card makers to easily stamp and cut out images and layer them as they see fit on their cards.

Q1 - What is the best paper for card making?

This always depends on what you intend to do with it. For stamping though it's always best to use a smooth white cardstock. This will make your stamped images stamp nice and smooth in the colors you choose to stamp with.

Q2 - What supplies do I need for card making?

There are a few basic supplies that you will need for card making, these being cardstock and adhesive. The next step is to work out what you may want to put on your card, be that patterned papers, embellishments, die cuts or stamped images. For stamping you will need stamps, ink and acrylic blocks to start.

Q3 - How do you choose cardstock?

This depends on what you want to do with it. For stamping it's always best to use a smooth white cardstock. For die cut images you may want to use colored cardstock. If it is a layering die cut, having colored cardstocks in various shades helps.

Q4 - How do you use washi tape on cards?

It is very easy to use washi tape on cards. Simply unroll the desired length of washi tape and adhere into place on your card.
