- From 1975-1983, Bears practiced at **Lake Forest, IL**
- Bears enjoyed one of their most successful drafts in club history; 17 rookies played throughout the season.
- New head coach: 38 year old **Jack Pardee**. Pardee was solid NFL LB, and coached WFL. Record: 20-23. Coach Pardee had approached 6 WFL players he had coached. Bears had to forfeit 6th round pick.
- Inauspicious starts for Payton on 9/24, 10/12, and 11/23. 10/19 game against Pittsburgh: only time in Payton's 13-year career he did not play.
- **Defense** allowed club record 48 TDs (14G season). Old record: 47 in 1964.
 - Opponent's 25 rushing TDs was also a club record; 379 points allowed tied 1964 club (27 ppg).
 - Bears were penalized for attempting to sign WFL players.
 - Club suffered many blowouts: 8 losses were by 20+ points.

Thomas: scored 629 career points with Bears, and later became Justice of Supreme Court for the State of Illinois.

Lost: WR George Farmer (Detroit)

Payton lore: One of the most dynamic, sturdy, and charismatic players in NFL history.

Among the several NFL records (many since broken) Payton held: **Career rushing yards:** 16,726; rushing **attempts** (3,838); **most yards rushing** in 1 game (275), **most career** 100-yard rushing games (77), **most career** 1,000-yard rushing/seasons (10). Payton scored 66 TDs while at Jackson State.

Chicago Bear records include: Total TDs (125), rushing TDs (110), rushing TDs in season (14, tied with Gayle Sayers), (2) 200- yard rushing games, (10) games in single season rushing for 100+ yards, (9) consecutive games rushing for 100+ yards, 492 receptions/4,538 yards, 15 TDs.

Payton was also an accomplished passer: 11-34/331, 8 TDs and 5 interceptions.

Payton entered **Hall of Fame** 1993. Six years later, Payton died of liver cancer at the age of 45.

9/21: **Lost to Baltimore 35-7** at home. Colts led 21-0 at the half. Bears' lone TD came on 1-yard TD by Douglas in the 3rd Q. Colts embarrassed the Bears, leading in yards (304-121) and 1st downs (26-6). Turnovers: Bears 2, Colts 0.

9/28: **Beat Philadelphia 15-13** at home. Bears led 9-6 at the half on 44-yard FG by Bob Thomas and 7-yard pass from Huff to Cid Edwards. *Second-half:* Thomas booted 2 FGs (24 & 26 yards). Eagles led 1st downs (21-14) and 327-294 in yards-gained. Turnovers were even at 2/ea.

10/5: **Lost to Minnesota 28-3** away. Vikings led 21-3 at halftime. Bob Thomas's 46-yard FG came in the 2nd Q. Stats: Minnesota led in 1st downs (23-10) and in yards-gained (355-192). Turnovers were even at 2/ea.

10/12: **Lost to Detroit 27-7** away. Lions led 14-0 at the half. Bears' TD came in the 4th Q on a 7-yard pass from Huff to Bob Grim. Lions owned the stats: 21-16 in 1st downs and 320-238 in yards-gained. Tough day, yardage-wise, for Payton. Turnovers: Bears 5, Lions 1.

10/19: **Lost to Pittsburgh 34-3** away. Steelers led 10-3 at halftime. Thomas's 32-yard FG gave the Bears an early lead. Payton's only game in his 13-year career that he did not play. Pittsburgh led in 1st downs (25-16) and yards (303-242). Bears were penalized 7 times for 109 yards. Turnovers: Bears 1, Steelers 0.

10/27: **Monday Night Football: Lost to Minnesota 13-9** at home. Vikings led 10-7 at the half. Bears' TD came on 14-yard run by Adamle. *Second-half:* Hartenstine tackled Viking QB Fran Tarkenton for a safety. Minnesota led in 1st downs (18-11) and in yards (331-216). Vikings RB **Chuck Foreman** rushed 26 times for 102 yards. Turnovers: Bears 3, Vikings 1.

11/2: **Lost to Miami 46-13** at home. Halftime: Dolphins led 20-6. Bears' points came on 2 Thomas FGs (27 & 31 yards). Bears' 2nd-half TD came on 4-yard run by Payton - his 1st NFL TD. Seventh game in a row the Bears' opponents owned the stats. Miami led in 1st downs (20-16) and in yards (439-283). **Nat Moore** caught 4 passes for 113 yards, including a 79-yard TD pass from Bob Griese. Turnovers: Bears 2, Dolphins 1.

11/9: **Beat Green Bay 27-14** at home. Bears led 17-7 at the half on 34-yard FG by Thomas, a 12-yard TD pass from Huff to Parsons, and a 5-yard run by Payton. *Second-half*: Thomas kicked a 48-yard FG and DB Craig Clemons returned an interception 76 yards. Stats were mixed: First time Bears led in 1st downs (15-13); Packers led in yards (309-261). Turnovers were even at 3/ea.

11/16: **Lost to San Francisco 31-3** away. Niners led 10-3 at the half. Thomas's 33-yard FG came in the 2nd Q. **Noteworthy**: Payton recorded his 1st of 77 100-yard games. San Francisco led in 1st downs (21-11) and yards (335-200). Turnovers: Bears 2, Niners 3.

11/23: **Lost to Los Angeles 38-10** away. LA led 21-3 at the half. Thomas's club-record 55-yard FG made the score 14-3. Final points came in the 4th Q on Avellini's 32-yard pass to Rather. Rams led yards (340-216) and 1st downs (17-12). After a hard tackle, Payton was no longer assigned to return kicks. Rams RB **Lawrence McCutcheon**: 15 rushes for 114 yards and 1 TD. Turnovers: Bears 3, Rams 1.

11/30: **Lost to Green Bay 28-7** away. Wind chill -2 at game-time. Packers led 28-0 at the half. Payton scored the Bears' TD on a 1-yard run in the 3rd Q. Green Bay led in 1st downs (22-11) and yards (309-132). Packers RB **John Brockington** rushed 26 times for 111 yards and 3 TDs. Turnovers: Bears 6, Packers 4.

12/7: **Beat Detroit 25-21** at home. Bears led 10-7 at the half on a 36-yard FG by Thomas and 4-yard run by Payton. *Second-half*: Thomas kicked a 41-yard FG, Payton scored from 5 yards out, and Harper followed with a 27-yard run. Stats belonged to the Lions: 1st downs (19-15) and yards (345-313). Lions WR **Marlin Briscoe** caught 5 passes for 119 yards and 2 TDs. Turnovers: Bears 4, Lions 3.

12/14: **Lost to St. Louis 34-20** at home. Cards led 17-0 at the half and 34-0 into the 4th Q before the Bears answered on Avellini TD passes to Bob Grim (24 yards) and Bo Rather (48 yards) and a 10-yard run by Payton. St. Louis led in 1st downs (19-18) and in net yards-gained (362-326). Cards RB **Jim Otis** rushed 33 times for 147 yards & 2 TDs. Turnovers: Bears 2, Cards 1.

12/21: **Beat New Orleans 42-17** away. Bears led 21-10 at the half on a 1-yard run by Avellini and two TD passes from Avellini to Greg Latta (13 yards & 5 yards).

Second-half: Livers returned an interception 40 yards, Avellini connected again with Latta (20 yards), and Payton ran 54 yards for the Bears' final TD. First and only time during the season Bears led in both 1st downs (19-17) and yards (458-197). Payton's rushing yards were most by a Bear since 1968. Turnovers: Bears 3, Saints 5.

League:

- Players played the 1974 season without a signed Collective Bargaining Agreement. New contract offer was rejected in mid-September. **Players' strike** delayed start of training camp. This was NFL's 4th walkout in 8 years.

US District Court found NFL's **Reserve Clause System** illegal.

NFL's Reserve Clause: a player was bound to his NFL team for the full length of his contract plus 1 year.

- The **Rozelle Rule:** if a player signed with another team, the new club must compensate the old. If the two teams could not agree on the compensation, the commissioner would then make the final determination. Judge determined that the Rule prevented other clubs from bidding for free agents and impeded players from earning their true market value.

Outcome:

- If a player played the extra year without signing a new contract, he was allowed to negotiate with a team of his choosing.
- Federal court also ruled NFL's portion of the college draft was in violation of anti-trust laws.
A player drafted by one team was prohibited from seeking better contract from another,

NFL appealed the court's ruling. Outcome: The draft and transfer stayed, but the League granted additional benefits to players with 5+ years of service. Result – no strike, no lockout.

RULES: Double-shifting inside the 20-yard line was legal; penalties for ineligible player downfield on pass plays and offensive pass interference was reduced from 15 yards to 10 yards.

- **Divisional winners** with the best records were the home team during playoffs.
- Cincinnati Bengals coach **Paul Brown** stepped down after the season and was replaced by Bill Johnson.
- **Bum Phillips** began coaching Houston Oilers.
- Cowboys re-introduced the **Shotgun offense** –a scheme first utilized by San Francisco vs. Baltimore in 1960.
- **World Football League** (version 2) failed early, despite signing marquee players like Calvin Hill, WR John Gilliam and RB Anthony Davis. **Chicago Wind** offered NYJ QB **Joe Namath** \$4M to play. Namath chose instead to remain in the NFL. **WFL** folded in week 12 of their 20-week season. NFL teams were allowed to bid for WFL players

Streaks: **Minnesota** began 10-0. **Pittsburgh** won 11 in a row. **Baltimore** won 9 in a row.
Baltimore's +8 turnaround was a NFL record. **San Diego** lost 11 in a row.

- 9/28: **Buffalo** beat Pittsburgh 30-21. Bills RB **OJ Simpson** rushed 28 times for 227 yards.
- 10/6: **Dallas** beat Detroit 36-10. Cowboys' defense sacked QB Greg Landry 11 times.
- 10/19: **Miami** beat NY Jets 43-0, out-gaining Jets 437-176. Jets QB **Joe Namath** (8-33 for 60 yards) was intercepted 6 times.
- 11/17: **Cincinnati** beat Buffalo 33-24. Bengals QB **Ken Anderson**: 30-46 for 447 yards & 2 TDs.
- 11/23: **Minnesota** beat San Diego 28-13. Vikings QB **Fran Tarkenton** broke Johnny Unitas's NFL record for completions (2,831).
- 11/30: **San Diego** lost to Denver 13-10 in OT despite out-gaining Broncos 336-123 (24-3 in 1st downs) and 80 plays to 41.
Chargers downfall was their passing: 8-20/8 yards (net) and 6 interceptions.
- 12/7: **San Diego** beat Kansas City 28-20. Chargers' 1st win.
Chargers avoided becoming NFL's 1st team to go through season without a win.
- 12/14: **Cleveland** beat Kansas City 40-14. Browns RB **Greg Pruitt** rushed 26 times for 214 yards & 3 TDs.
- 12/20: **Minnesota** beat Buffalo 35-13. Vikings QB **Fran Tarkenton** broke another Johnny Unitas' record: 291st TD pass.
- 12/21: **Oakland** beat Kansas City 28-20. Oakland Raiders K **George Blanda** scored his 2,000th career point.
- 12/28: Divisional playoff: **Dallas** beat Vikings 17-14. Cowboy QB Roger Staubach threw a 50-yard "Hail Mary" TD pass to Drew Pearson with 0:24 left. The term "Hail Mary" stuck.
- Buffalo set new NFL record for yards gained 5,467 (old: SF, 1965).
RB **OJ Simpson** scored NFL record 23 TDs (old: 22, Gale Sayers, Bears 1965).
Minnesota Vikings RB **Chuck Foreman** scored 22 TDs.
 - **Billy "White Shoes" Johnson's** 4 TDs on returns tied NFL record held by Travis Williams (GB) & Cecil Turner (Bears).
