Hi Everyone,

How the world has changed since our last Cat Chat went out in April this year, and how long ago this seems.

We sent members an update several weeks ago as to how Cat Haven has coped during the last few months during the COVID 19 pandemic.

Fortunately we have been able to remain open the whole time for our adoptions, surrenders and vet clinic.

We have been assisting other rescues in more remote locations from as far away as Broome, Karratha, Kalgoorlie and Albany to rehome their cats and the Cat Haven van and our wonderful volunteers has been one of the few visitors to Perth Airport picking up these cats.

There hasn't been the expected wave of surrenders some had forecasted and we believe this is because the public have been very genuine in accepting a feline into their lives - once you've converted to cats there is no going back.

We have lost two major fundraising events during this time but have been able to apply for and receive a grant from Lotterywest to cover lost income for which we are incredibly grateful. Thanks to two of our long term volunteers Brenda and Del for putting the time into writing this grant application and making it happen.

Our staff and volunteers have been coming up with on-line fundraising ideas and our Thermomix raffle sold out in four days with the Dyson vacuum, hairdryer and straightener in about the same time.

Through volunteers again we developed an on-line shop which is an off-shoot of our popular Felines and Fashion brand of quality pre-loved women's clothing and accessories.

(www.felinesandfashion.com.au). We have seen sales go throughout the country and again we thank our wonderful Felines and Fashion volunteers lead by Katy.

So whilst we reduced our volunteers on-site during the pandemic in an effort to minimise personnel on-site, our volunteers have been greatly assisting in many other ways such as these.


We moved, for the first time ever, to an appointment system for adoptions, again to enable social distancing in the adoption shed. This has proven to be very successful with our team members being able to give a one on one service to potential adopters and matching the right cat for their lifestyle.

Our end of financial year appeal cat, Cooper, touched so many people who generously donated to his appeal. He is now happily rehomed and living with another equally handsome FIV ginger boy.

It has been a very stressful time for everyone, and we are still not sure of where life is going right now, but as an

organisation, we feel incredibly lucky to have got through it so far relatively unscathed in terms of continuing to be here for the cats of Perth. We couldn't ask for more than that.






Meet Cat Haven's Board Members

Slow and Sleepy Kitty? Think Arthritis!

Cold rainy days make us all sleepy and move a bit slower and often people notice these same changes in their pet cats.

In older cats this can also be a sign of arthritis. Often symptoms are worsened in the colder weather, and we see a lot more cats for mobility issues in the season. Arthritis in cats is often something that is overlooked and under-diagnosed due to the lack of recognition of the condition by both owners and veterinary surgeons. Cats have a natural survival instinct to hide signs of pain and so the traditional symptoms recognised in other pets such as dogs, are often not apparent in cats. Rarely do owners seem them limping like many dogs will.

Studies have shown that up to 90% of cats over the age of 12 have changes on their radiographs (x-rays) that indicate osteoarthritis. Osteoarthritis is a specific type of arthritis in which the normal cartilage that cushions the joint is worn away, exposing the bone and resulting in discomfort. Major factors that pre-dispose cats to osteoarthritis include:

Previous injury to the joint (fractures, dislocations, ligament damage).

Obesity leads to extra weight load on the joints meaning they wear down prematurely and worsens symptoms of arthritis.

Genetics can play a role in some breeds (Scottish folds, Mane Coons, Abyssinians).

How do you know your cat has arthritis?

Cats are masters at hiding pain, but often monitoring them closely can help you see the subtle changes in their routine. Cats will often restrict their own movement if they have joint pain rather than be seen limping or vocalising. These are even harder to notice since they do not go for walks with us. If you can take a video, this can be very helpful to your veterinarian. I have included a list of things you may see with arthritis in your cat below.

Signs that your cat may have arthritis:

Reduced mobility

- Changes in their ability to jump this is the most important sign to look for.
- Reduced height of jumping e.g. no longer getting up on kitchen bench.
- Reluctance or hesitation before jumping up or down from furniture, appear to think carefully before jumping.
- Reduced frequency of jumping up to usual places.
- Difficulty or slow when using stairs or getting through the cat flap.
- Pulling themselves up with front legs to get onto the couch or the bed.
- Litter tray accidents, urinating and/or defecating outside the litter tray, reluctance to climb into high sided tray.
- Reduced agility e.g. will jump on chair before jumping on table.
- Lameness or stiff/stilted gait is relatively uncommon in cats with arthritis.

Reduced activity

- Increased time sleeping or resting.
- Not hunting or exploring the outdoor environment as frequently.
- Reduced interaction e.g. lack of response to petting.
- Reduced interest in playing with toys, people or other animals.

Changes in grooming behaviour

- Matted and scurfy coat, difficulty grooming themselves.
- Some cats will over-groom themselves over painful joints causing hair loss.
- Overgrown claws due to lack of activity.

Temperament or behaviour changes

- Sleeping in different, easier to access sites.
- Lack of tolerance of handling, children, other pets.
- More irritable or grumpy when handled or stroked.
- More irritable with people and other animals.
- Withdrawal and avoidance of interaction with household

If you think your cat may have arthritis, then a trip to the veterinarian is required. While it can be trickier to notice than in dogs, as they rarely want to walk confidently in the consult room, your vet will use their hands to feel joints and try and test their movement. Those with pain will resist the movement and often we can see subtle signs of pain from them. Being gentle and not rushing will help the cat relax and behave more normally, facilitating a more rewarding examination.

The next step in the diagnosis involves radiographs (x-rays). Ideally at least two views are taken of the affected joints and changes seen include the formation of new bone around the joint margins (the body's attempt to 'stabilise' the joint). Sclerosis (thickening) of the underlying bone and narrowing of the joint space are also observed.

Further laboratory tests are not usually required to diagnose osteoarthritis, however as affected cats tend to be older, they may have more than one disease. As a minimum it is recommended to assess a complete blood count, serum biochemistry blood panel and a urinalysis to screen for other illnesses before prescribing medication.



Management of the arthritic cat does not start and finish with a pill or potion. Home comforts and management adjustments are vital to the improving the cats' quality of life and can be just as important as medications.

Easy home and management adjustments for the arthritic cat:

- Provide soft beds for sore joints in easily accessible, quiet places.
- Place beds in quiet, draft free areas of the house.
- Igloo beds or cardboard boxes can make an older cat feel warm and secure.
- Provide 'steps' up to higher sites, e.g. the sofa, the cat flap.
- Tie the cat flap open so the cat does not need to push through.
- Always have a litter tray inside and use a low-sided version or cut out the sides to make it easy for arthritic cats to
- Use different types of litter that are softer for sore feet.
- Make sure food and water are easily accessible, at floor level or with steps up to higher levels.
- Put food, water, and litter trays on one level to avoid the cat having to use stairs.
- Radiator beds are popular but again arthritic cats will need help to get into them. Other warming devices such as wheat bags can help but electrical devices should be used only when the cat is monitored.
- Arthritic cats may need extra grooming and help cleaning eyes and perineal region.
- Overgrown claws need regular cutting.

Each cat's treatment plan will need to be tailored to the individual. This is especially important if your cat has underlying diseases like chronic kidney disease, diabetes, or heart disease. There is no one-fits-all treatment for arthritis and over time the medications or supplements often need to be adjusted as the disease progresses. Your cat will need regular check-ups with your veterinarian and be sure to discuss any changes you are seeing in their activity and behaviour with them.

Just because it is cold and they are old, does not mean we cannot help them. Osteoarthritis is a common condition in older cats and while it can be challenging to identify, be sure to discuss it with your veterinarian. Be mindful that the signs of arthritis in cats are very subtle and taking videos at home can help us see better. Medications can be very effective and can improve a cat's quality of life significantly. Concurrent geriatric disease should be always be considered before such drugs are prescribed. Remember those non-medical management changes are very important to make cats more comfortable in their day to day life too.

Did you know that Cats can Donate Blood?

The gift of blood is truly the gift of life...

Xander is an 11 year old much loved male Siamese. He came to The Animal Hospital at Murdoch University (TAHMU) in May with symptoms of chronic kidney injury. Xander is a battler and has been cared for by his loving family as he has struggled with Chronic Kidney Disease for a while. On this occasion an acute onset was a bit much for Xander and he was feeling less than well when he was admitted to the hospital. As a part of Xanders disease process he had become dangerously anaemic. Amongst other care, Xander needed a blood transfusion and he needed it immediately.

Enter the Community Blood Bank. Pet cats in our community come into the hospital and donate blood to support sick and injured cats that need blood transfusions. TAHMU is the only veterinary hospital in Perth that stocks feline blood for immediate emergency blood transfusions. Good news for Xander! He arrived and was quickly triaged by our Emergency and Critical Care team. Time was of the essence and a sample of his blood was Typed and Crossmatched against available feline blood of the same blood type. Cats are born with pre-formed antibodies on the surface of their red cells and so it is critical that we transfuse type specific and compatible blood. Just the same as in people.

Siren is a lovely little white & torti DSH who lives with her family and their menagerie of pets on their horse property. Siren has been a blood donor with us for some time. Bagheera is a majestic back DMH who shares his house with his brother Snow and a handsome hound. Our community blood donors come in to see us approximately 4 times per year to donate blood for cats like Xander. Without this service, Xander would not have responded so well to the treatment provided and been able to recover and head home to spend more days being spoilt.

After Xander returned home his family were provided with information about the donors that gave a part of themselves to help get Xander back on track. Xander's owners sent a lovely letter recognising the effort that a donor family goes too. This letter was passed on to our Donor Families and they love to hear how the recipients of their cats' donations are going.

Thank you so much for dedicating your time to bringing Siren and Bagheera in to donate blood at Murdoch Vet

Our beautiful 11 year old cat Xander has had a long road dealing with Chronic Renal Failure for the last 7 years. He was recently admitted to Murdoch ICU with Acute on Chronic Renal Failure as well as Severe Anaemia. We honestly thought it would be the end.

As part of his treatment he received a much needed blood transfusion that was kindly donated by you and your cats generosity. We are certain that Xander would not have survived without this precious gift you have given us.

Xander is now home again and enjoying snuggling his days away with his cat brother Oliver and the rest of the

Cat requirements are:

- Between 1-8 years old
- Ideally 5kg, or greater, we will accept 4.5kg if very suited to be a donor.
- Healthy with a relaxed and calm temperament
- Current on flea preventive
- **Current vaccinations**
- Ideally donor cats are indoor cats. However, we recognise that many cats are indoor/outdoor cats and we take this into consideration.

A message from our Cat Welfare and **Adoptions Manager**

For those of you that don't frequent the site, you might not be up-to-date with the many changes around the facility recently.

For those of you that don't frequent the site, you might not be up-to-date with the many changes around the facility recently. One of those changes has been my appointment as the Cat Welfare and Adoptions Manager, more usually referred to as the Grounds Manager. You may have seen my face around the site before over the last couple of years, having previously been the Customer Service Team Leader. Coming into this role I knew taking on the position of Cat Welfare and Adoptions Manager was going to have its challenges. The Ground's Department is a large team of both staff and volunteers that are hands on with the daily care of all of the cats and kittens that come in and out of our facility. This team of people are passionate and dedicated, and have a tremendous amount of pressure to ensure our cats and kittens are cared for, with ever fluctuating numbers of those coming through our doors. Every day is different, and the team often have to work in the heat and rain, starting in daylight and ending in the dark. Adding to this, COVID-19 saw our resources very quickly reduce as we moved very swiftly to a skeleton crew. What can I say, my first 6 months as Manager has been eventful!

Thankfully I have been surrounded by a supportive Cat Haven team of staff and volunteers, and as restrictions ease, the daily pace is starting to feel a little more "normal", although that "normal" does feel very new. You can't come through such a challenging time and not have learnt some very valuable information, not only about our operations, but about our team and how we manage to pull together, even



on the hardest of days. As we move forward, we take with us the good things we have learnt and apply them so that we can continue to better our processes and the care we give for our cats and kittens. These good things include truly appreciating the role our volunteers play as part of our team. Revamping our volunteer program on

grounds is going to be a big focus for us as we welcome back existing volunteers and new volunteers come on board. Another good thing is changes in the adoption process - we now have kennel hands and volunteers providing one-onone assistance through adoption bookings. The response we have had to this change has been amazing and our adoption rate has increased which is so great to see. You will also see much lower numbers of cats onsite as we do our best to be only a short 'pit stop' for cats on the way to either foster or adoption. Fewer cats on site and shorter stays in the shelter significantly reduce stress for the cats and allow us to focus more on the needs of the cats within our care. I am very much looking forward to seeing the result of these changes over the next 12 months as I think we are going to be seeing some pretty amazing things achieved. We have much more planned, so watch this space.

A message from Paris– Cat Haven Foster Care

With restrictions lifting and everything starting to feel normal again we can finally catch our breath and reflect on the last few months at Cat Haven.

When everything with COVID-19 started to become a very real concern, the management team at Cat Haven had to ask a question we never imagined "What do we do during a global pandemic?"

We had to plan for all the worst case scenarios such as going into lockdown, not being able to do adoptions, losing our income and the possibility of increased surrenders.

The solution became evident, we needed to get all our cats into foster homes. The foster team responded with a phrase you'll hear a lot across Cat Haven "All we can do is try!"

We knew that every single foster carer was impacted by COVID-19 in their own way.

We spoke to carers who had lost their jobs, had kids home from school, were stuck in guarantine, had compromised immune systems and despite this, they still offered to help.

So while the news was full of stories of people fighting over toilet paper, we instead got to witness the selflessness of our foster carers every single day.

Within two weeks of making the decision to reduce our

numbers on site, we placed 235 cats and kittens into foster homes! Essentially clearing the shelter. And for the past three months we have been maintaining numbers of 50-70 cats on site. Which has been a huge effort as we normally sit around 200-300.

During this time we also received over 200 new foster care applications!

The response from our carers, both old and new, was a testament to the people of Perth and how they selflessly stepped forward to help when we needed it most.

We are optimistic as ever that our foster program will continue to grow thanks to all the new interest.


So on behalf of myself and the Foster Care team I wanted to acknowledge all our amazing foster carers, as it would not have been possible without them.

Cat Haven's Foster Care Program

As COVID 19 started to accelerate, Cat Haven was swamped with offers of foster care assistance from members of the public.

As the crisis deepened and restrictions were put in place, many people offered to take a cat or kittens into their homes to ease the burden on us. Many were first time foster carers with a spare room and a big heart, who just wanted to help animals during the upheaval. One such person was 14 year old Emily whose family had adopted from us several years ago and who wanted to help further. We gave Emily and her family (that includes footie player Dad, Karl Langdon), three kittens who needed to gain weight and be socialised prior to adoption. Like all our foster carers, the Langdon family put their hearts and souls into caring for the kittens, who in turn provided endless entertainment with their antics. Even the family dog bonded with them - not sure if the family cat ever did though! The hardest part of fostering for many is letting them go, and not knowing which home they have gone to. Will it be as good as the foster home they have just come from? Emily was no different and felt a huge loss when she had to return



her litter to Cat Haven. Fortunately one of Emily's neighbours, and a long time Cat Haven supporter, Ann, had met the kittens and couldn't imagine not adopting Maggie May as she is now called. So now Emily can watch one of her little charges grow into a beautiful cat.

Cat reunited with owner after missing for 6 months thanks to microchip

A very beautiful but hungry ginger and white cat by the name of Ginger Meggs recently arrived at Cat Haven after being trapped in Whiteman Park. When he arrived into our care we immediately scanned him to see if he had a microchip and to our delight he did! We searched the microchip number on our database and noticed that he was already entered on our system as he was adopted from Cat Haven back in 2017 when he was only a tiny kitten! His owner April, who had been searching for him since he accidentally got out during a home relocation, was so excited and relieved when she received the phone call from our cat welfare staff explaining that her beloved Ginger Meggs had been brought in and was safe and sound in our care. April had been frantically searching for him since January and had done everything she could to try and bring him home including door knocking, hiring a trap, distributing flyers and phoning local vet clinics. Thanks to April making sure her contact details were up to date on his microchip, Ginger Meggs is now back home with his loving owner.

It just goes to show how fantastic cats and pets are for mental health particularly during these challenging times



Having just read your latest newsletter, I felt I must sing the praise of the company of a cat.

Some months ago I adopted from the Cat Haven a 2 1/2 yrs old white female puss (with golden eyes) to replace my long lived, white odd eyed, Sabrina.

I changed the new cat's registered name to Sabbytoo. She settled into a totally inside life with me and is a marvellous companion. She was quite happy to sleep while I went to my Trinity School for Seniors several days a week. She would watch the way I dressed each morning, giving a quiet sniff when I put on formal shoes, indicating that I was heading off.

This amazing animal never goes outside, in fact she obeys my hand signal to stay at the door, which no other feline companion has done for me.

During this difficult time of lockdown isolation, she has been a treasure. I am in my mid 80s living alone in a large home. Sabby and I have meaningful conversations especially at mealtimes of course, but also during smooch times when she lets me know that she appreciates my company, and the frequent brushing. Her only fault is that she will not let me clip her claws, but she is quite aware that the sharp points are uncomfortable when she goes into the punching dough mode on my lap.

I thoroughly recommend the company of a cat, especially a white girl as they seem to be more placid than coloured ones. Cats need not be the active hunters as labelled by some folk.

Something no one knows about me is...

He was a year old and not very big and nobody was really sure what happened to him...Our other two cats didn't like him much as he tended to ambush them and generally pick on them. But as time went on they came to tolerate him mostly.

He drags cat biscuit packets out and chews his way into them and has been known to bin dive and pull stuff out. He has a fixation with feathers and carries them around the house and sometimes you wake in the morning to feathers on the bed.

He also loves ping pong balls and has incredible ball skills which make up for some of his other skills. On his adoption papers it said he shouldn't be allowed to jump on and off things. He hasn't read them so we are always lifting him off the bench or vanity! We are so happy we were able to give him the loving home he so deserves.
