

Miracle Fruit Plant

(Synsepalum Dulcificum)

Sapotaceae

Origin: Gold Coast Africa



Light Preferences

Thrives in bright, full filtered light. Cannot survive in low or moderate light.



Water Preferences

Soil does best in evenly moist soil and high humidity. Water when top two inches of soil is dry. Use filtered or rain water only.



Growing Zones

Flourishes in zones 9–11. Includes southern most states. Does best in Florida, Arizona, Texas, and Southern California.



When Your Plant Arrives

Use a soil with no fertilizer when transplanting as the fertilizer will severely dry out the roots.

Water the plant liberally for the first week in it's new home.

Leave your Miracle Fruit Plant in a shady area for the first 1–2 weeks. Placing it immediately in direct sunlight will burn the leaves.

Adding Vitamin B1 to your soil can help your plant become acclimated after transplant.



Signs of a sad plant

Pale Leaves, Low Fertilizer & High pH

Fertilize your plant more often and add sphagnum moss to the top of the soil to lower pH levels.

Yellow Leaves, Roots & High pH

Repot and add sphagnum moss to the top of the soil to lower pH.

Burned Edges, High Salt Contents

Water your plant generously to remove salt from roots.
