Rules of the Game

Who? What? Where?

Setting Up

- 1. Together with the child*, choose a game board. For children under 2, start with the "Where?" board, which is easier. Then you can move on to "What?", "Who?", and "What is he or she doing?".
- **2.** Take the **Question cards** and the **Look Everywhere cards** for the chosen board. Shuffle the cards and place them face-down by the board.







Playing the Game

- 1. To start the game, the child picks a Question card.
- Ask the question associated with the board while the child looks at the Question card.
- 3. The child then answers the question. "Where?" questions are answered by pointing at the object or the character on the board. All other types of questions need to be answered out loud.**
- **4.** The child then looks for the item or character on the board (except for "Where?" questions). Once found, the card is set aside.
- **5.** You or the child then picks a new **Question card** and the game continues as before. If you are playing with the child, you can ask the question, give the answer, and then help the child find the answer on the game board.
- **6.** When someone picks a **Look Everywhere card**, they must look for the item on the board without first answering a question. You can point out to the child that the same item appears on all the boards, so you and the child can look at other boards as well, if you wish. Once the item is found, set aside the card.
- **7.** The game ends when all the items and characters on the **Question** cards have been found on a game board. You can always keep playing on another board.

<u>Variant:</u> When playing the "Where?" board with the child, you can pick the **Question card** for the child, and ask the question. The child then answers without seeing the card. This tests whether the child truly understands the item or character they are looking for.









^{*}The word "child" is used here to mean one or more children near the game's target age range.

^{**}Recommended answers appear on the Question cards, but any logical answer is acceptable.
