Boandik Country has influenced me from the time I was a young boy, right through to my time now as a father and an educator. It's part of me.



During my childhood, I was constantly exploring and fishing much of this amazing area. My family also relied on the environment to make a living. Spending so much time outdoors in nature instilled in me the importance of looking after and respecting our environment. We call it *Caring for Country*.



During my later teens, I started helping my Dad on his crayfish boat. Dad was a great fisherman and he taught me many things. One of the most important lessons he taught me was to never take more than we needed from the ocean. We practised this for many years and it meant that there was always plenty of fish for everyone. It also meant that the crayfish populations stayed strong and healthy.
