My name is Aunty Nita Taylor and I'm a Gumbaynggirr Elder. I was born in Grafton in the beautiful Northern Rivers of New South Wales. I am one of twelve children and my family name is Duroux. This is a well-known Indigenous name in the Clarence Valley.




As a young girl, I lived in a place called Cangai. This small town is in the foothills of the Gibraltar Range, which is part of the Great Dividing Range. This range stretches from the very top to the very bottom of Australia.



Cangai is over seventy kilometres from Grafton, and it took us over an hour to travel there by car. Back when I was a little girl, we didn't own a car and if we wanted to go anywhere, we had to walk.

Teacher Notes:

My Childhood-Aunty Nita is a non-fiction recount of the author, Aunty Nita Taylor's childhood, living in the small village of Cangai in the foothills of the Great Dividing Range in New South Wales. Through her recount, Aunty Nita explains the importance of family, community, place and culture and shares her memories of the beauty of the wild Northern Rivers of New South Wales and her proud Gumbaynggirr heritage.

Discussion points for consideration:

- 1. Talk about the differences between Aunty Nita's childhood and that of the today's children.
- 2. Aunty Nita talks of making their own fun how important is it to be able to make your own fun rather than relying on things to stimulate your mind?
- 3. Find examples of where Aunty Nita and her family lived sustainably off the land.
