My name is Ken Jones and I'm a proud Elder from Boandik Country in South Australia. My family lived close to the sea at a place called Port MacDonnell. Dad made a living as a commercial fisherman for many years. He mostly fished for crayfish. They were plentiful in the area.



In 1947, Dad and my older brother Frank, fished on an old sailing ketch called the "Aloma". They were often seasick in the very rough seas. It was a tough life for them. I was only 18 months old when Frank was killed in a trucking accident. It affected us all badly and Dad took it really hard.



When I was 13 years old, my Dad decided to build his own wooden dinghy. He was good at many things and boat building was just one of them! Dad borrowed a dinghy from his mate Bert and we copied the design. We built five similar boats. We sold four of them and kept one for ourselves. We launched the dinghy off the beach at Deep Creek and we rowed out to sea.
