

### **Teacher Notes:**

Bushfires have become an even bigger threat to Australian communities and wildlife over the last few years. Izzy's story about her own bushfire experience in her sleepy little village of Nymboida in Northern NSW tells just how frightening and destructive these fires can be. But her story is also one of hope and positivity and how the kindness of strangers can make such a huge difference in helping people to rebuild their homes and lives again.

### Discussion points for consideration:

- 1. Talk about a bushfire experience in your local area what effects did it have on the community and the wildlife? Why is it important to talk about these events?
- 2. Why are bushfires becoming more intense and destructive?
- 3. Explore the tradition of Aboriginal mosaic burning. How might this tradition help reduce the impact of bushfires in the future?


