

KNOWLEDGE BOOKS

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Teacher Notes:

There are many opportunities to discuss the way the people reacted to the unknown. Finding this colossal person washed ashore would be terrifying to most people. How do people react to differences in people and unknown information? This story can be used to describe the historical times when Swift wrote this satirical story and how the little peoples reacted to the foreign intruder. The map in the story shows the distant place of Lilliput in the Indian Ocean. This would have been considered a very remote and unknown country. Australia's East Coast had not been charted at this stage.

Discussion points for consideration:

- 1. How would you feel to find a giant person in your park?
- 2. Why were the people of Lilliput so scared of Gulliver?
- 3. How was a friendship made with the people of Lilliput?
- 4. The map shows Lilliput in the Indian Ocean near to Australia. What would British people know about Australia? Look at the map on the title page. Remember this was 70 years before Captain Cook reached the east coast of Australia.
- 5. Jonathan Swift wrote about egg cracking differences between two countries Lilliput and Blefuscu. The countries were ready to go to war over how eggs were cracked. This is a very ridiculous reason for creating a war. The author was making a satirical comment about 17th Century England's wars with France and Spain. What do you think the author's message is to us today?

1. Shipwreck


Lemuel Gulliver was a doctor. He could not get enough work. He went to work out at sea.

The sun shore into his eyes. It was very bright



3. Gulliver Goes to the King


Gulliver was very hungry. With his free hand, he pointed to his mouth. The tiny people climbed on Gulliver, bringing food.
