



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GREEN TURTLE FACT SHEET

- Turtles are reptiles.
- They are also termed 'amniotes' because they breathe air and don't lay eggs underwater.
- They are NOT amphibians.
- Turtles have a hard shell for protection.
- They have existed for 215 million years.
- Sea turtles have glands that remove salt from the water they drink.
- Green turtles are endangered.
- They can live for up to 80 years and weigh between 65 130 kg.
- The green turtle is one of the largest sea turtles and is the only herbivore among the different species.
- They spend most of their lives underwater.
- They can rest for 5 hours before coming up for a breath.
- If feeding or travelling, they pop up every 3 5 mins.
- Female turtles lay their eggs in a nest dug out on a beach.
- Each clutch contains around 110 eggs.
- Air temperature determines gender low = male, high = female.
- After 2 months, babies use an 'egg tooth' to break through their egg.
- Then the race to the ocean begins!









Materials Required:

- Paper plates
- Textas
- Dark green and light green crepe paper
- Goggle eyes
- Scissors
- Glue

Instructions:

- Cut the crepe paper into squares.
- Cut out a head, four flippers and a tail for your sea turtle.
- Draw a face for your turtle.
- Glue the goggle eyes on.
- Decorate the plate shell with the crepe paper.
- Attach the head, flippers and tail to the paper plate.
- Your turtle is done!
