






#### CEFFYL DŴR <sub>Water Horse</sub>



#### Flæðarmús Tide Mouse

The tide mouse mostly dwells on the ocean floor, preferably at great depths. It is shaped like the field mouse, only larger. The tide mouse needs silver (some say gold) in order to survive, and it only comes ashore if great tidings are afoot. Good fortune awaits those who succeed in capturing a tide mouse. They must immediately place it in a waterproof container, pour seawater over it and put a silver (or gold) coin in the container. A day later, another coin of equal value will have appeared alongside it. The coin that was placed in the container is then removed, and this procedure is repeated once every day. One must remember to change the creature's seawater daily.

#### Útburður Spirit of an Abandoned Newbor

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When mothers expose their newborn children, leaving them where they will not be found, they turn into a ghost known as an *útburður*. When they are seen, their appearance resembles that of a bird, such as a raven. They raise themselves up on one knee and one hand and flutter about. Their colour depends on the colour of the rag in which they were wrapped. Those who see an útburður should not hesitate to follow it, as it will eventually flee to its mother.
