A late start as a full-time artist, after a career in television and advertising, hasn't been a hindrance at all; in fact, she's taken off like a rocket and is still going full speed.

Having studied first at Manukau Institute of Technology where she graduated with a Diploma of Visual Arts, then AUT where she gained a Masters of Visual Art with Honours, she immediately began exhibiting and has shown in Auckland, Wellington, Sydney Paris, Poland and New York.
