### A CONVERSATION WITH MARCIA DYSART

You've been involved with Reflections for a long time. How did you get involved initially?

I had been at Renaissance for a couple years and attended a meeting with Elizabeth Fanto who was the editor at that time. My role became a juror for prose. The next few years I also did some of the announcements and some small posters to encourage members to submit their pieces.

We have quite a few new members at Renaissance. Could you give us a short history of this publication? How has it evolved and changed over time?

Two members, Jo Atwater and Margaret Doyle, began the magazine in 1992. At first, they sold it for \$3.50, but later it was decided to be included in the membership fee. For 11 years, it was in black and white, 38 pages of art and writing. We then moved from black and white to one color, and then to full color pages. When Jo resigned from the position in 2003, Laurie Rosenberg did 2004-2005; Jim Butzow did 6 years, 2006-2012; Elizabeth Fanto did 6 years, 2014-2020.

Carolyn Sutton and I have continued it from the 2020-2021 issue. We have always aimed for at least 40 pages per issue, featuring most of the artists and writers from Renaissance.

Please describe the process of putting together Reflections. You have teams of people performing specific tasks, correct? Is there a defined order in which these things are done?

There are quite a few steps in the process of producing Reflections. This is the members' time of year; from now until Jan.12, poetry and prose can be submitted. All art and photography needs to be in by Feb. 6. Art must come to, and be picked up in, the office-due to the need to photograph pictures. Everything else is online.

Very quickly after each deadline, submissions are sent to respective jurors, judging is completed, and some clarity starts with the jurors' choices. Carolyn sets up a master page for each editor and designer so that we can enter submissions into InDesign software, several design and layout sessions take

place and covers are discussed. From mid-February through late March, editors and designers are busy finalizing each page, looking for problems, making corrections and choosing many of the attractive borders, strokes and background colors. Then Carolyn resolves problems on every page, using the InDesign magic that no one else understands; then the magazine goes to publisher, proofs come back to designer and are approved; the publisher completes the magazine, and it is distributed at the end of the semester.

You are the editor for prose content and Carolyn Sutton is the editor for graphics, correct? Can you describe the challenge—and also the rewards—of coordinating all the teams working on *Reflections*?

Speaking as the editor who receives submissions, the challenge is to make sure to get each piece (name of person, title of piece, category or medium, and number of words in prose) in a file.

The rewards are working with others on taking those independent submissions (we usually get 130-145 items) and turning them into the final magazine. A stressful, but productive, day in February is when all designers and editors get together and put the jurors' preferences out on tables; everyone will have looked at them before, but it is the opportunity as a group to agree on matching poetry and prose with specific artwork

Does everyone work from home, or are some functions performed in the Renaissance offices?

Each of Carolyn's and my years have been different, but we have progressed from working on Reflections from home to being able to use computers in the Renaissance office, which has enabled some of us to learn some InDesign creative basics and features for the magazine.

Is the entire membership of RI invited to submit prose, poetry, art and photography? Or is it limited to members of writing classes, art classes, etc.?

ALL RI members who would like to are encouraged to submit. Some think they are not good enough. but have been pleasantly surprised by giving it a try and finding success.

Often the advice is to submit three items, preferably of different size or length. Why is this? Are shorter prose pieces preferred?

"Since members submit all prose and poems to me, opening each one is like a gift." Although no one does so, members may submit as many as 12 items (art, prose, photography and poetry – 3 per category).

Because we have many creative contributors we try, if possible, to include at least one piece from each submitter, but sometimes there is not enough room. All media are juried by three or more jurors. Many times our designers and editors would be happy to include several submissions by one person, but the expense of printing our publication limits the choices based on space. Prose pieces of 1200 words (the maximum) take two pages and with dialog, even more. so shorter submissions often work best.

#### This sounds like a lot of work. What makes it all worthwhile?

Since members submit all prose and poems to me, opening each one is like a gift. Reading pieces about nature, family memories, philosophical ideas, travels, incidents and many other topics leave me amused, thoughtful, remembering similar situations, emotional and always inspired by the creativity.

Please remind us of the deadlines! Can people start submitting stuff now?

YES! We are happy when people do not wait until the last minute

- Guests are welcome, but members come first when there's a limit. **Email the sponsor** to see if you can bring a guest.
- Note activities which include a fee and check with sponsors to see if they need the money in advance.
- Bring a mask, for indoor activities, in case it's required.
