The Wairarapa region is on average a cool climate for growing Olives. While Summers are typically dry, yearly rainfall is, for Olives, quite high. This influences our Olive Tree choice. The below recommended varieties have proven themselves as good reliable performers for our region, and as such are the PRIME READILY AVAILABLE VARIETIES that we at GardenBarn will always endeavour to have good supplies of on hand. These are in order of preference of good performers as recommended to us by local Olive Tree professional growers.

### **OLIVE INFORMATION**

#### **POLLINATION**

While some varieties are self-fertile, others need to be planted with another variety for cross pollination. Even varieties that are self-fertile will benefit with increased yield by planting another pollinating variety. Refer to Olive Chart for information.

Wind pollinated therefore Olive growers plant 1 to 7/1 to 10 ratio of suitable compatible varieties.

#### **HARVESTING**

For commercial plantings usual spacing is 5m between trees with rows 6m apart. This is for ease of machinery for harvesting. Olives can be picked when unripe to produce green olives, or when ripe to produce black olives.

#### **OLIVE ESSENTIALS**

- Many Olive varieties are self-fertile, but as a general rule, more than one variety should be planted to ensure good pollination.
- Olives grow best in very sunny, sheltered spots. They have a shallow root system so plant well out of wind.
- Water well during early stages, in dry spells, and when fruit is developing.
- Olives HATE wet feet, so ensure good drainage.

- If in pots, ensure good free draining potting mix and raise pots on feet for good drainage in wet seasons.
- Apply a well balanced liquid fertiliser monthly during the growing season. Fertilize in Autumn and again in Spring with slow release high nitrogen based fertilizer (citrus), 200gm per tree per year and increase 200gm per year, up to 2kg in total.
- Olives are relatively resistant to pests and diseases. 'Peacock Spot' on leaves may be a problem and can be attributed to poor tree health but spray with copper after rain. Good air circulation will help reduce susceptibility. Scale insects, spray with summer oil.

#### **PRUNING**

Year 2-3. Remove damaged branches, branches growing into canopy, branches below 900mm.

Year 4-6. Develop vase shape maintaining an open canopy for sunlight.

Mature Trees. Prune to assist harvesting and keep tree open.
