SISTER,

It wouldn't surprise me if at this very moment you are walking through a situation in which you cannot see the hand of God at work. Perhaps you are suffering from chronic illness. Or maybe you've been hurt deeply and you feel broken, unable to grasp the hope of healing. Or perhaps you are walking through a season of uncertainty, transition, and confusion, and you are wondering where God is in the midst of the scattered puzzle pieces of your life. It seems in the ebb and flow of life that we are always waiting for something from God, whether it be healing, redemption, answers, restoration, or a resurrection of some sort. If a resounding "yes" echoed in your heart as you identified with one (or many) of the circumstances I listed above, know that you are in the right place, and even more importantly, that you are not alone.

I'll even dare to say that **you're in the exact place God wants you to be.** I know that's hard to read when you can't see His hand at work or feel His presence in the waiting, but hear me out. The Bible contains numerous examples of God's people walking through situations similar to yours. They desperately cried out to God for help in their distress, just like you and I do. Sometimes, it seemed that God remained silent, and other times He spoke loudly, quickly, and clearly. However, despite whether they heard the voice of God answer or continued to wait in their wondering, God **was** there with His people—fighting for them, pursuing them, and keeping the world in motion. **Your world is no exception.**

The book of Esther is extremely unique when compared to the other 65 God-breathed books of the Bible because it never mentions the name of God. When I first heard this I was confused and taken aback. *Really?* God would divinely inspire a book of the Bible that doesn't mention His very holy, sacred, and powerful name? The answer to that question, I soon learned, is *yes*. The book of Esther is marvelously woven with **one thread** holding it together, and that thread is **sovereignty**.

The sovereignty of God, referring to His ability to know, see, and control all things at once, is evident in the tiny details of the book of Esther. As we uncover His "fingerprints" together in the following weeks, we will see there is ample evidence of His work behind the scenes. **Though God is not mentioned, He is there.**

That is why the name of this study is called *Esther:* The Fingerprints of God. Like a detective, you are embarking on a journey through this historical book of the Bible, uncovering the fingerprints of God that are layered throughout the text. As you investigate, my prayer is that you'll not only uncover and more fully understand the sovereignty of God in

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the book of Esther, but also in your own life. When you can't see God at work in your present circumstances, you can know that He is with you. Hindsight is always 20/20, and we have the privilege of reading the book of Esther in hindsight.

BEFORE WE BEGIN, LET ME PRAY FOR YOU:

Father, I recognize that you are mysterious in all your ways. There are a million aspects of your character that we will never fully understand this side of heaven. 

A KING, A QUEEN, AND AN UNLIKELY SCENE

The book of Esther is a peculiar one. Written as a historical narrative retelling part of Israel's history in light of God's amazing grace, this unlikely story unravels with God's providential fingerprints over every circumstance. The first chapter sets the stage. Pay attention to the details listed, for all of Scripture has a specific purpose and is breathed out by God. The writer of this book included descriptions, scenes, and snapshots of the storyline with purpose and careful attention to detail. Likewise, the author did not include specific details that you will likely want to know more about. Ask God to bridge the gaps as you study, and to illuminate His Word. Be more concerned with what God has revealed in the Word than what He has not revealed. Trust Him with the entire story as you look for His fingerprints throughout, starting in the very beginning.

EVERLASTING GLORY

SCRIPTURE: ESTHER 1:1-4

Before you begin your study each day, take time to pause, pray, and prepare your heart and mind to receive God's unfailing Word. Praise God for who He is. Confess your need for Him and ask Him to ignite in your heart an insatiable hunger for His Word and His ways. As always, rely on Scripture more than any word of man. I'll start us out in prayer today:

Father, you are exceedingly greater than we could ever grasp with our finite minds. Your goodness chases after us every day (Psalm 23:6). Your faithfulness is our foundation when the earth starts to tremble beneath our feet. Your lovingkindness holds us together and extends a comforting arm of embrace during our lowest moments. There is none like you, none who can compare to you. Today we come to you, confessing our desperate need for you as we read Your Word. Not a moment goes by in which we do not need your hope, wisdom, and salvation. As we study the book of Esther, change us from the inside out. Open our eyes to behold wondrous things out of your law (Psalm 119:18). We love you, Lord, more than anything in this life. In Jesus' Name, Amen (so be it).

In the unfolding of history, during the period of the books of Ezra and Nehemiah, we find the events of the book of Esther. It is not a stand-alone book, but rather a record of a significant part of Israel's history. Today, as we set the stage for the story and historical narrative that is about to unfold, we will travel back in time and slip our feet into the Israelites' shoes in order to better understand how the original reader would have felt. Brace yourself, because events will escalate quickly and change rapidly, just as the events of our very own lives often do.

"NOW IN THE DAYS OF ... "

The book of Esther commences with these notable words in its first verse, declaring the setting and scene of the story of Esther. It is imperative to note and understand why these details were shared from the get-go. "In those days" (v. 2) is the author's attempt to give context to this historical book.

Read verses 1-2. Write down everything you learn about the context of the book of Esther.

The first person we are introduced to in the book of Esther is Ahasuerus, King of Susa. Ahasuerus is a Hebrew translation of his Persian name, Xerxes I (depending on which version of the text you are reading, your Bible might say Xerxes).

Ahasuerus, as we will soon learn, was a man of pomp and splendor, exhibited in his prideful ego. He controlled a vast amount of land and people and flaunted his power to the world around him. In regards to worldly riches, Ahasuerus "had it all." According to the Greek historian Herodotus, the grandeur of the Persian empire surpassed that of King Solomon's, and the treasures of Solomon's palace were lavish to say the least. (Read a full description of Solomon's palace in I Kings 7.)9 Ahaseurus's power, pomp, and prestige are highlighted in the first chapter of Esther, and will be key to understanding how the story unfolds.

Read verses 3-4. What do you learn about the setting of this book? What can you also ascertain about Ahasuerus's character from verse 4?

Ahasuerus was king of Persia from 486–464 B.C. The book of Esther was likely written around mid—late 5th century B.C. In the third year of his 21-year reign, Ahasuerus held an extravagant, lavish feast to honor ... himself. You can almost smell the pride wafting from his ego in verse 4 and following. The king held a feast for all of his officials, servants, nobles, governors, and armies of Persia and Media to display "the riches of his royal glory and the splendor and pomp of his greatness for many days, 180 days" (v. 4). In other words, he wanted all the people to stop what they were doing and gawk in awe at his earthly greatness. Not just for one day, but for an extended 180 days. That amounts to almost half of an entire year!

The Hebrew word for "glory" in this passage is *kabowd*, referring to honor, abundance, splendor, reputation, and dignity.¹⁰ The "glory," or *kabowd*, of King Ahasuerus was a temporary glory. All earthly abundance comes to an end. All earthly honor can be tainted in the blink of an eye. All earthly pride can be humbled and brought low. However, the glory of Almighty God has no end. It causes men to stand in awe for all of eternity, and compels us to bow low in holy reverence and fear.
