Prince is remembered as one of the greatest musicians and performers of all time. But before he achieved global superstardom, he was a child growing up in Minneapolis, with a universe of music inside him. From his first forays into writing songs with his school friends to his unprecedented three—album record deal at 19, and his surprise hit film *Purple Rain* to performing at the Super Bowl, Prince was never afraid to blaze his own trail—creating something entirely new, entirely free, and entirely *PRINCE* that would shape music and culture and resonate with audiences for generations to come.

Matthew Burgess is a poet, professor, and children's book author. He teaches at Brooklyn College and is a teaching artist in New York City public schools. He is also the author of, among other titles, Enormous Smallness: A Story of E.E. Cummings; Drawing on Walls: A Story of Keith Haring; Make Meatballs Sing: The Life & Art of Corita Kent; and Sylvester's Letter. He lives with his husband in Brooklyn and Berlin. The daughter of Thai immigrants, Sirin Thada was born and raised in Baltimore, and has been making art since childhood. Most recently, she was the in–house illustrator for Catapult magazine, and has been published in the Washington Post, Guardian, TIME magazine, and more. She currently lives and works in NYC along with her husband, scientific artist Jason Brougham, and their adorable rescue pup, Indie. The Purple One is her picture book debut.

This magnificent new title from Icinori starts as a word book of things to be thankful for and turns into a thrilling adventure story along the way



What starts as a series of "thank yous" addressed to common objects that inhabit our daily lives gradually builds into a fantastic journey across landscapes, seasons, and inner discoveries. Deceptively simple, each page acknowledges the contributions of a different object (spoon, rock, beasts) or concept (summer, slumber, surprise), with each image building on the next to create a dazzling narrative that invites readers to puzzle and play, explore and discover, appreciate and marvel. Aaron Becker's *Journey* meets Carter Higgins's *Circle Under Berry* in this visual tour de force and invitation to look at the world with new eyes.

Icinori is an experimental design and illustration duo, made up of couple Mayumi Otero and Raphael Urwiller. Designers, visual artists, and editors, they concoct a wide range of projects together, spanning illustration, graphic design, exhibitions, publishing, and teaching. They have published several artists' books and children's books, including Et Puis, which was selected as an honor book in the fiction category of the 2019 Bologna Ragazzi Awards, and have contributed art to the New York Times, Wired, and Forbes Magazine. Growing up in a French—Chinese American family, Emilie Robert Wong attended school in the French national education system before studying comparative literature and neuroscience at Harvard College. She is an associate editor at Enchanted Lion, as well as the co–translator, with Karin Snelson, of You Can't Kill Snow White (shortlisted for the Global Literature in Libraries Initiative's Translated YA Book Prize) and At the Drop of a Cat (a Kirkus Best Book of 2023 and a NYPL Best Children's Book of 2023).



Kyo Maclear is an essayist, novelist, and children's author. She has written over 25 books for little and big people, many of which have been translated internationally. She holds a doctorate in environmental humanities and teaches writing in Tkaronto/Toronto, where she lives with a lively family of cats and musicians. **Katty Maurey** is an illustrator who has published many picture books. She is passionate about painting, sculpting, printmaking, and, most of all, marveling at the natural world. Among other distinctions, her work has been nominated for the Governor General Award in the children's book category.

Anna Read is an Australian artist whose work spans painting, ceramics, music, theater, and garden design. Always deeply committed to and informed by her connection to the natural world, Anna was a co–founder of Studio Su in Castlemaine, a ceramic gallery space. She is also the co–founder of Parachute Press, a small independent publisher. Anna resides in Campbells Creek, a little town on the edge of Castlemaine in central Victoria.

From rising author Mk Smith Despres and award–winning illustrator Eugenia Mello comes a touching, insightful picture book about a girl, her fish, and the circle of life



A girl does everything with her fish. And the fish does everything with the girl (or at least, everything it can within the confines of its glass bowl). But one fateful day, the fish stops moving, no matter how hard the girl tries to rouse it or how patiently she waits.

But this is not the end of the story. For the fish gets buried in the yard, so its body can help nourish the roots of an old tree. Time passes, the seasons change, and the fish's body beautifully spreads into the dark earth. Fall, with its swirling leaves, passes into winter and then spring arrives, and with it the unfurling of new leaves. Is this a story of metamorphosis? Has the girl's swimmy friend transformed? Beautifully layered, and beautifully moving through time, this book carries us into that most essential place of life—that of interconnection and participation, for we all belong to the same circle of life.

Mk Smith Despres writes, teaches, and reads lots of books with their family in western Massachusetts. They are also the author of the picture book Night Song. Eugenia Mello is a Latin American, Brooklyn—based illustrator and graphic designer from Buenos Aires, Argentina. She studied graphic design at the University of Buenos Aires, where she also taught design and typography courses for many years. She holds an MFA in illustration as visual essay from the School of Visual Arts. In 2017, she was awarded a gold medal from the Society of Illustrators for her illustrated moving piece Hope for the Day, and in 2019 she received a silver medal for Why Are We Still Dismissing Girl's Pain?, an Op—Ed illustration for the New York Times.



Will Miss Leoparda be able to nourish a new awareness and help her community return to their senses? Natalia Shaloshvili writes and illustrates books for children. Her picture books *Miss Leoparda* and *What a Small Cat Needs* have been translated into many languages, with more books coming soon. She creates illustrations with acrylic paints and watercolor pencils, finishing them digitally. Besides making picture books, Natalia is an artist, with works showcased in exhibitions worldwide and held in private collections. She lives in London with her family. She likes big and small cats and riding a bike. Lena Traer is a Russian— and English—language literary translator with a focus on books for children and young adults. 





Baron Lamberto is very old, very rich, and very sick. He lives on a private island in the middle of Lake Orta, tended to by his butler, Anselmo, who keeps track of the baron's 24 maladies, 24 banks, and endless eccentricities. After a mysterious trip to Egypt, the baron hires six people to take up residence in the attic of his villa. Their only task? To repeat his name, "Lamberto, Lamberto, Lamberto," throughout the day. Why is anyone's guess, but Baron Lamberto does appear to be getting better, little by little, day by day. But trouble looms when Lamberto's nefarious nephew Ottavio enters the scene, scheming up a way to get his hands on the baron's fortune. And things go from bad to worse when a band of 24 bandits (all named Lamberto, too, by the way) lays siege to the baron's villa and attempt to hold him for ransom.

In typical Rodarian fashion, *Lamberto, Lamberto, Lamberto* is a thoroughly enjoyable, deeply thought–provoking read. While it playfully skewers the absurdities of the rich, the bureaucracy, the media, and more, it also encourages readers to liberate their imaginations, to expect the unexpected, and to embrace the kind of possibilities that normally only happen in fairy tales.

Italian author **Gianni Rodari** wrote many beloved children's books and was awarded the prestigious Andersen Prize. He was also an educator who understood the liberating power of the imagination. Decades after his death in 1980, Rodari's writing remains as powerful and innovative as ever. **Roman Muradov** is an artist, illustrator, and graphic novelist living in Brooklyn. His surreal illustrations have appeared in a variety of esteemed publications, including the *New York Times, Wall Street Journal,* and *Vogue*. He has received numerous awards from institutions like the Art Directors Club and the Society of Illustrators. **Antony Shugaar** is a writer and translator. 




