Sexism and Science

In this collection of essays, Reed attempts to show how pseudoscientific postulations and sexist prejudices have obscured the truths and distorted the facts discovered in certain sciences: namely, anthropology, biology, primatology, sociobiology, and sociology.

Although not disparaging what she considers genuine discoveries, she makes a valiant slashing effort to reduce some "reactionary" giants (Robert Ardrey, Claude Lévi-Strauss, Lionel Tiger) to windmills. Reed has a certain flair with terminology and a fresh iconoclastic lack of academic decorum. She is knowledgeable in the disciplines under discussion.

Overall the book is a stimulating corrective to establishment academic doctrine and popular scientific vagaries. Recommended for scientific, women's, as well as nonspecialist collections.
