

Materiality, Care

The plastic used in Meltingpot tables is originally sourced from recycled fridge interiors. The surface of the table can be expected to behave in in a similar way to the inside of a fridge: for example, staining from exposure to rust, and scratching when in contact with sharp or hard materials.


Meltingpots are entirely solid and well-suited to generations of use. To reach this milestone, we recommend the following approach to care.

As gentle maintenance, we suggest wiping down with a solution of warm water and baking soda.

To buff away superficial scratches, stains, or marks, we recommend the use of a pan scrubbing cream and damp cloth. Based on where you live, this product is known as Cif, Jif, Vim, Viss, and Handy Andy. Buffing in a circular motion with moderate pressure will achieve the best results. Once finished, it is important to wipe down with water to prevent further contact between the cleaner and the table.

For deep cuts or surface damage, the table will need to be repaired by a woodworker. Further instructions can be supplied upon request.

We do not recommend that Meltingpot tables live outdoors, as certain pigments may fade or yellow over time.
