MUDCLOTH // BOGOLAN

The art of making mudcloth is a timeworn tradition passed down from mothers to their daughters. Handwoven by men, and painted by female counterparts, this is the one of the most revered traditional forms and artistic expressions in Mali, West Africa. Designs are made from boiled tree bark and leaves, and the final pigment is achieved through application of mud from local roverbanks. The unique properties of these natural ingredients are only found here.

JUJU HATS

Made from bird feathers and natural dyes, they are worn as hats during a traditional Kuosi ceremony sometimes worn by the wealthy in conjunction with a large beaded elephant mask. They are meant to look like flowers when worn atop the head. 100% ethical and natural.



KUBA CLOTH

Made in Congo by the Kuba people, this accent textile is versatile for its one-of-a-kind design features, and organic material. Made from raffia and dyed from natural pigments, this heirloom textile makes a decorative statement around your home framed or on accent seating.





EKIBBO


Ekibbo means "basket" in Luganda, the primary language of Uganda, where these baskets are made. Traditionally, they are used by the groom during wedding ceremonies as he gives gifts to the bride's family.



BAULE

The Baule people originate from Ivory Coast. They are known artistically for both their wooden sculptures and their woven textiles. Their textiles are most notably one-of-a-kind, with neutral backgrounds and whimsical, even neon embroidery accents. The sculptures tend to take on a more restrained form, as they are used to communicate between spirit worlds.




FANG MASKS

Made by the Ngil society of the Fang people, Fang masks are carved in a trademark elongated or heart shape. They are associated with judicial functions.

Carved in the form of an antelope, the Chiwara sculptures are used to introduce Bambara boys and men to their agricultural responsibilities. They are used during ceremonies that initiate the villages' youth into this new chapter of manhood and greater responsibility.
