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County commissioners, county auditor review on purchasing process

A month into the new fiscal year, the Bosque County auditor and his assistant recommended that all county offices temporarily pause issuing new purchase orders

Bosque County Auditor Jesse Jobes and assistant Polly Lail presented their concerns about the county's requisitions during the Bosque County Commissioners Court's meeting on Monday, November 20.

The two public employees noted that due to not following the county's policy on purchases, some county offices were trending towards budget deficits through over-spending.

During their presentation, Jobes and Lail speculated that several offices had probably under-budgeted for this fiscal year.

Jobes stated that there were three issues with the purchasing practices: timely submissions to the auditor's office to review, stacking invoices on already opened purchase orders, and not closing out blanket purchase orders in a timely fashion.

Bosaue County Judge Cindy Vanlandingham said she appreciated Jobes and Lail for coming forward with their concerns.

Via email, Jobes provided The Clifton Record / Meridian Tribune with an update on efforts to prevent the county departments from incurring a budget

deficit.

Jobes said that county auditor's office had taken the following steps:

"The auditor's office will provide projections to quarterly county departments that hold blanket Pur-chase Orders (Pos) in order to mitigate a budget deficit at fiscal year-end (FYE).

"Conversations are being held with the respective county departments in order for the department to reign in purchasing of supplies and/or materials.

"All avenues are being explored with the vendors in order to mitigate price increases where applicable.

"As before, strict adherence to the County's purchasing policy is being enforced."

Jail status update

Bosque County Sheriff Trace Hendricks gave an update on the Bosque County jail's population figures.

Line-item transfers

The court approved two line-item transfers requested by the Bosque County Sheriff's Office.

The sum of \$18,000 was moved to software maintenance from five funds: investigations (\$1,500), training (\$2,000), contingencies (\$1,000), vehicle repair (\$2,500), and capital outlay (\$11,000).

The funds went toward covering the Kologik invoice for the remainder of COPsync that was left out of the fiscal

Ideal for real estate development, food production, ranching and municipal supply, WWF aims to manufacture portable units that can be used to determine groundwater levels for two important applications: extraction through water well drilling; and ideal placement for aquifer recharge zones to collect harvested rainfall, returning water back to the earth.

Austin Technology Incubator – the deep tech incubator at The University of Texas at Austin – is the longest active technology incubator in the United States and has helped numerous entrepreneurs effectively commercialize their breakthrough innovations and compete in the global marketplace.
