


Pickle Dish








If you are one of the many people with a favorite paper piecing technique, please just apply it to this pattern. If you have no experience, this is a simplified explanation of paper foundation piecing. You may want to read more or take a class before pursuing a project as large as this.

In spite of the fact that this method is messy, wasteful, ignores grainline and is actually sewn upside-down, many people love it. They think the precise seams and paint-by-number approach are worth any negative aspect and we think that describes a Pickle Dish project perfectly.





There are two copies of the pattern for paper-piecing Pickle Dish Arcs. Make a photocopy and compare one of the patterns to the Arc template. If it is not quite the correct size, adjust the output percentage on the copier and print again. Sometimes increasing or decreasing by one or two percentage points will make it just right. Make a note of your settings. Since photocopiers vary, use the same machine and the same settings if you make additional copies at a later time.

In the illustrations above, both light and dark fabrics are shown in the #1 position in the Arcs. Make sure you start correctly for your chosen design.
