SECTION 4 First aid measures

Eye Contact	 If this product comes in contact with the eyes: Wash out immediately with fresh running water. Ensure complete irrigation of the eye by keeping eyelids apart and away from eye and moving the eyelids by occasionally lifting the upper and lower lids. Seek medical attention without delay; if pain persists or recurs seek medical attention. Removal of contact lenses after an eye injury should only be undertaken by skilled personnel.
Skin Contact	 If skin contact occurs: Immediately remove all contaminated clothing, including footwear. Flush skin and hair with running water (and soap if available). Seek medical attention in event of irritation.
Inhalation	 If fumes or combustion products are inhaled remove from contaminated area. Lay patient down. Keep warm and rested. Prostheses such as false teeth, which may block airway, should be removed, where possible, prior to initiating first aid procedures. Apply artificial respiration if not breathing, preferably with a demand valve resuscitator, bag-valve mask device, or pocket mask as trained. Perform CPR if necessary. Transport to hospital, or doctor, without delay.
Ingestion	 If swallowed do NOT induce vomiting. 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Indication of any immediate medical attention and special treatment needed

Treat symptomatically.

Treatment of intoxication by the bromide ion includes hydration, the maintenance of mild water diuresis, and sodium, or even better, ammonium chloride (10-15 gm. daily in divided doses) with an osmotic or high ceiling diuretic. Haemodialysis may be of value. [GOSSELIN, SMITH, HODGE: Clinical Toxicology of Commercial Products] In acute poisoning the stomach should be emptied by aspiration and lavage and sodium chloride given by intravenous infusion. Dextrose has also been administered and frusemide may be given to aid diuresis. In severe cases of bromide intoxication or when usual treatments cannot be used haemodialysis or peritoneal dialysis may be of value. [MARTINDALE: The Extra Pharmacopoeia]
