Yes, but sometimes it makes me question myself. For me, essay writing is being in this mindset of "trying," so I get in the mode of looking for support for what I'm trying to say. And then I start seeing connections and parallels. And then I get excited because I think I'm on a roll...or maybe it's just confirmation bias. It's walking a line of feeling like you understand the world or you're just banging around in the echo of an idea.
