n recent months the support for MAAW from the local community has been amazing. From people making donations of food and cash at Bunnings, to a major fund raiser at the local tattoo parlour, we have been overwhelmed by the support.

Generous community members drop off food, or pop their change into our donation boxes at several businesses in the area. When we put the call out for blankets, towels and food for our kittens, the locals didn't disappoint. They dropped their donations off at the shelter where the girls were able to put them to immediate use.

Without doubt the most amazing effort was by Forest Creek Tattoo. In March they held a special day with all proceeds going to MAAW. Tattooists from Castlemaine and Melbourne worked all day on a constant stream of clients. They organised a sausage sizzle and a bumper raffle. Businesses were eager to get involved and donated prizes. Our 'hatted' restaurant, Bar Midland, coffee shops, florists, Theatre Royal, gift shops, T. Shirt shops — the list of prizes was massive.

The efforts of this incredible fund raised more than \$11,000. With this money we are completing the outdoor area of our cattery and there will be money left over to begin much needed work on our kennels. The generosity of Forest Creek Tattoo and their staff and clients means we can continue to provide the animals in our care with a safe and comfortable environment.

#### **News from the Shelter**

here is an ever-increasing emergency in animal shelters across the state and MAAW is no exception. It is a direct result of the financial hardship being felt by so many of our residents. Add to this the increasing rate of homelessness in our region and people are unable to afford to care for their pets. This situation is at crisis point. More loved pets are being surrendered to us than ever before.



And the kitten catastrophe continues. In May alone we had more than 40 cats and kittens brought into the shelter. These put added pressure onto our staff and volunteers who are caring for these animals. Some of the kittens have been so tiny our dedicated animal attendants take them home at night to make sure they get the care needed to help them thrive.

All of this puts a strain on our finances as we cover all the veterinary costs and ballooning food bills. The continued donations of food that is dropped off at the Op. Shop, Shelter and the food collection bin at the Maxi IGA is gratefully received. We thank everyone for their ongoing support.

The number of reluctant dog surrenders are increasing. It is sad to see the obviously devastated people who make the incredibly hard decision to give up their beloved pets for rehoming.

### A volunteer's tale

eorge Targett has been volunteering at the MAAW shelter for just over a year. The twenty-year-old is happy to help wherever he's needed, be it working with the animals or taking on any of the many cleaning jobs that always need to be done.

George has an eye for detail, right down to things like cracked litter trays that might be dangerous for the little paws digging around or the volunteers on cleaning duty.

"Work health and safety is important," he says taking a break from kitten duties last weekend.

George comes into the shelter most Saturdays and Sundays. If he is working with the dogs, he begins by giving them a biscuit treat and then gains their trust with a scratch behind the ear or back massage.

"Lots of the dogs just need hugs," George explains.

Sometimes his work will entail giving the dogs that much needed attention. On other days he will walk the dogs or take them into the exercise yard.

When George works in the cattery, he spends time with the kittens and cats once the cleaning tasks are completed. He does have advice for anyone thinking of joining him volunteering. 'Don't trust beauty'. One of the kittens took a shine to his hands and nibbled away on his finger, leading to a little bite under the nail. The culprit was one of the prettiest little kittens waiting for adoption.

It didn't deter George. He was back at work the next week and won't let the kittens munch on his fingers again.

At home George has two pets, his cat Scrabble and mixed breed dog Lily. Lily came from MAAW and had suffered some trauma in her previous life. She's now settled into the loving home environment with George and his family and Scrabble.

For George the MAAW shelter is a special place. It gives him a chance to shine and get to know new people. He thrives on his work helping make life a little better for the animals in our care.

"And I love being connected to the people here and just being me. The people here are another family for me."
