Kidanizawa Mountain Stream

Hakuto Shrine

"Inaba no Shirousagi" is a Japanese myth originating from the Izumo region. The god "Okuninushi" saved a white rabbit and it arranged a match between the God "Okuninushi" and the princess "Yakamihime" as a sign of gratitude. And it is said this myth took place in Hakuto Shrine. As the birthplace of Japan's oldest love story, Hakuto Shrine is known as the shrine of marriage and many people visit here from within and outside Japan. They have goodluck charms and ema, small wooden plaques to write prayers, related to love so you can't miss this shrine if you wish to fulfill.




Enmusubi Stone


It is said that the gift from the White Rabbit will descend if you wish in front of the enmusubi stone.

Adachi Museum of Art


The Adachi Museum of Art was founded by Adachi Zenko in 1970 as a way of combining his passions for Japanese art and garden design. He hoped that viewing the gardens and artwork together would expand peoples' appreciation and interest in Japanese art. It has been ranked No. 1 in the leaderboard in "The Journal of Japanese Gardening" for 15 years since 2003.



Tachikue Gorge

A quiet, secluded walk through a riverside gorge, with an outdoor onsen nearby. Before the Kanda River emerges from the mountains out onto the Izumo plain, it passes through a narrow gorge with cliffs and spires of rock rising up more than 100 meters above, carved by the river over millions of years. Tachikue Gorge is both a National Scenic Spot and a Natural Monument, as well as being on the Chugoku Nature Trail.








Horikawa Sightseeing Boat

Matsue is connected by numerous canals and moats. The moats surrounding Matsue Castle (National Treasure) remain unchanged from when it was built over 400 years ago. This 55 min sightseeing boat will guides you along the moats through the historical Japanese scape of the castle Matsue, the relics related to Lafcadio Hearn, forests which have been there 400 years since the construction of the castle, charming changes of seasons and the beauty of moats itself.

Tachikue Gorge

Matsue is the capital city of Shimane Prefecture, in Southwest Japan. Known as the "City of Water", Matsue stands by the Sea of Japan where Lake Shinji and Nakaumi meet, in the middle of Shimane Peninsula. As a former feudal stronghold, Matsue is a true castle town crossed with many canals and boasts one of the twelve remaining original castles in Japan.

Matsue Castle is one of only a dozen original castles in Japan, meaning that its main tower has survived to this day through fires, earthquakes, and the anti-feudal demolitions of the Meiji Period. It is sometimes called the "black castle" after its darkly-colored, austere exterior. It was designated as a "National Treasure" again in 2015.



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
