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WHO ARE THE EURASIANS?



Eurasians have Asian and
European roots. That could
mean one parent is Asian, and
the other is European. Or maybe
their ancestors are Eurasians.

Long ago, many Europeans
who lived in Malacca and other
places in Asia were spice traders
from Portugal, the Netherlands
and Britain. Later they married
locals, and the families moved
to Singapore. Their children are
known as Eurasians.

WHAT LANGUAGES DO EURASIANS SPEAK?



Eurasians mainly speak English.

Depending on their culture,
Eurasians also know other
languages, such as Malay and
Chinese dialects.

Some Eurasians can speak
Kristang, a mix of Malay and
Portuguese. The language
started in Malacca, after the
Portuguese settled there in 1511.

Many Eurasians are Christians, because their European ancestors were Christian. Most Eurasians are Catholic, and some are Protestant.

Many Christian Eurasians celebrate religious festivals such as Christmas and Easter.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Church of the Holy Family in Katong was founded by four Eurasian families. It was an important place for Catholic Eurasians in the 1930s.

WHY IS CHRISTMAS IMPORTANT TO EURASIANS?



Christmas is a wonderful time of the year for Christians. The festival falls on December 25, which is when families celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ and reunite for a feast. Some Eurasians also go to church for a service.

For some Eurasian families,
Christmas is a rare treat because
many traditional dishes are cooked.
Devil curry, smore, feng, fruit cake,
Christmas pie and sugee cake
might appear. Eurasians might add
pineapple tarts and foods from
other cultures.

The home might also have a Christmas tree with presents underneath!

WHAT DO EGGS HAVE TO DO WITH EASTER?



Christians believe Jesus Christ rose from the dead, and they celebrate this miracle on Easter Day. Easter, a festival of sacrifice and new beginnings, is celebrated with eggs because they are a symbol of new life.

Christians might go to church and have an Easter lunch or dinner. Children are given chocolate eggs wrapped in bright tin foil. Shiok!

HOW ARE EURASIAN WEDDINGS CELEBRATED?

Christian Eurasians hold their weddings at churches. A couple will say their vows in front of family and friends.

A wedding breakfast or tea comes after. Fruit or sugee cake might be served as the wedding cake. Usually a live band plays, and wedding guests dance.
