The exhibition VIEW delves into Xiaoxiao's perspective on landscapes. Using intentional emptiness as a gentle portal for viewers to immerse in the vast scenes she captures. She generously opens the entrance to the wonderland she discovered through her sensitive gaze. "It depends very much on the background and culture you're from, what you see. It's like in language: if people want to express their ideas quickly they talk in clichés. In order to prevent such clichés, I actually prefer silence to talking. In the same way, I like emptiness in images." This conscious artistic decision adds an extra layer of intrigue to her work, challenging our perceptions and deepening our understanding of the relationship between the photographer, the landscape, and the cultural context."


Xiaoxiao's photographic view of the world is not a blocked wall to celebrate the artist's ego, not a decorated curtain to entertain any, not a thematic stage for any clichés narratives to be picked up from the existing visual vocabulary. Her view is an open window to this vast and fantastic world, invites you to explore, invites you to connect, invites you to live, within. Xiaoxiao's photographic view of the world is an invitation to explore, to connect, to live within. "It is in the unspoken moments, in the unwritten spaces, that I discover the subtle details that often go unnoticed. These are the moments I am looking for, the connection with history and the place that I want to capture and share through my lens."






"Grass growns on top of watchtowers. Ignored and destroyed to make space for the Great Wall, nature has been quietly working to repossess what was taken from her."
