Secrets for Easy Cover-Ups: The first secret is densely saturated inks. It also helps that in this case, my client has pale skin, the original tattoo is uniform in color and there is plenty of skin around the image.



All the color pigment is gone in this blue-based black, making leaves a convenient option for coverage. White and blue-based greens are ideal for the job; heavy greens to fill in the dark spaces and a lighter, white-containing green for the highlights. World Famous Tattoo Ink used: Vegas Green, Iceland Green, Outlining Black, Sailor Jerry Red and for richness: Milk Chocolate.

### Vasilii Suvorov @tattoo\_suvorov

The brightness of the colors in my tattoos is not a given; I mix them in my own special way.

Yellow: I never work with plain yellow. I layer it with pale yellow, neutral yellow and bright yellow shades.



Orange: I start with yellow-orange, continue with orange and finish off with dark orange. Stretching the gradient creates maximum brightness.

Don't underestimate the importance of a good outline on a tattoo. The tattoo on the right is less then 6 months old but looks super aged. I feel really bad when someone has to pay for a tattoo twice. She left extremely happy with the new tattoo and that's the part the matters the most to me.






How Lou became a tattoo artist: My father was a well-known tattoo artist and as a kid, I remember coloring-in tattoo outlines with crayons. Typical: he wanted me to be a doctor or lawyer, but after high school I finally got him to accept me as an apprentice. Almost right away I was tattooing full time.

Because we became known for our colors, people would come from all over and stand in long lines outside our door.

Why become a tattoo supplier. In the late 80s you didn't have big suppliers out there. You could buy powder, but you had to mix it yourself. At the end of a long day you'd have to go home and prepare your tools for the next day. Everything was



In the 90s, tattoo companies started appearing, but one company would tell me there's a six-month waiting list. That got me thinking: we make ink in the shop, plus everyone says we have the best colors, plus there's a big demand for this...

1998: We'd been meeting with the department of health to get tattooing legalized in New York City and when we achieved that, I was ready. I opened my first tattoo supply company.

Later I opened what was probably the first tattoo supply site with a shopping cart. That's when the bigger business in shipping the products all over the country and the world opened up to me.

In 2012. I focused on inks and started World Famous Tattoo Ink. As a tattoo artist myself, I know what is needed. With seven tattoo shops, I had 50 artists that worked with me, so I would give them samples: "hey, try this!"

The world was calling. I really wanted to push this, so from 2012 until COVID I traveled like a maniac. Watching my

Instagram I would literally be in China one week, then Russia, Poland, Germany.

My breakthrough came when I developed artist series sets directly with some really famous artists, like Alex Pancho. He's been there pretty much from the start of World Famous Tattoo Ink. He's a great guy, an experienced tattoo artist that others look up to and respect. When artists saw that he was working with World Famous, they wanted to try my product.



Artists' feedback from my team and top artists from all over the world was crucial in making the inks perform better. The biggest critic of my own work, I had to be the best ink.

**Tattooing motto:** Always diving deep into the science and sharing that knowledge.

### How did you get into tattooing?

A frustration with art and its limited forms. When I was young I would get frustrated seeing the art I created carelessly crumbled up in their notebooks. When I discovered tattooing, I saw an art form that forced people to take care of the art I created for them!

**Pros and cons of being a private studio owner?** Pros: It's peaceful. Once my
client walks in, I lock the door so we don't
get interrupted while we focus on our work.
The only real con is that I only have myself
for artistic growth. That's why I always

have a chair open for my friends to come guest spot at my studio so as artists we can share our thoughts and we can all grow together!

### Favorite style?

Somewhere between fantasy and realism meets comic book illustration.

### What type of machines do you use?

I have used a lot of different machines over the years. Right now, it's the Flux primarily. But then I have moments where I flip flop between the Xion and Flux. When doing black and gray that mechanical give on the Xion gives you a smoother shading when you're using, for example, 27 mags vs the Flux.

### Do you have any tricks related to inks?

Being based in South Florida, I have extensive experience with different skin

tones, pigments and sun damaged skin. The best tip I can offer is to create art and choose colors and inks keeping in mind how colors fade on different skin tones.

For example, if the client has yellow/ochre skin: colors like purple will heal neutral gray, pinkish skin tones kill bright greens, brown/red skin neutralize blues.
You'll notice this more when you're trying to create smooth transitions...

I don't wanna sound like a dork, but tattooing is science in practice! I encourage artists to dive deep and experiment more. Experimenting is a catch-22, but if you stubbornly stick to only what you know, you may never discover what's better.

For example, brands fade differently over time and with sun - here in Florida

we get a lot. Some brands fade evenly, they almost disappear. Others are unpredictable; their light colors darken and the dark simply fades. They meet in the middle and look muddy.

### Is there anything that someone should keep in mind about getting inked as they get older?

There is so much! From tolerating pain less and less as we age, to our blood "thickening" and becoming more of a nuisance to heal to the amount of sun damage - which I can assure you is very permanent! Side note: be a vampire, kids. Fuck the sun;)

So long as you're not suffering from any debilitating diseases like diabetes, there shouldn't be a reason not to be the old fart in the nursing home covered in super fresh ink!

# The Future of **Medicine & Tattoos**

Articles hinting that the future in medical tattoos is here today make great click bait, so even years after the research has been completed websites continue to publish articles on the subject. They cite a study from the university of Munich and two MIT inventions, one from 2017 and a brand new invention that indicates the wearer's vaccines.

**Spoiler alert:** none of these futuristic and potentially life-saving technologies has hit the market. The race is on!

But it isn't strictly about technology. Let's take a look at the fascinating potential of medical tattooing. One common limitation among them all is that the body could react negatively or reject the tattoo.

### Conventional tattoos that state the wearer's medical condition

Low-tech and accessible to everyone. An artist simply tattoos their client's medical condition (ex. "Diabetes Type 1") somewhere visibly on the body along with the internationally-recognized medical symbol; i.e. a staff wrapped by a single or double serpents.

**Why not just wear a medical bracelet?** Despite the disease, some people lead active lifestyles and find bracelets obstructive. Others would like to raise awareness through their tattoo.

**Limitations:** More public knowledge is needed of this tactic so that when a medical emergency arises, people coming to the aid will also look for tattoos. So spread the word!

### Biomedical "tattoos"

Nano biomedical devices can be implanted but mostly they refer to stick-ons with sensors that are laid out in tattoo-like patterns. These are still being developed. MIT did recently use invisible quantum dots, however, to insert into the skin as a record of the wearer's vaccines. These tiny crystals are only visible when shone with an infrared light.





### Possible limitations:

Privacy concerns. Also, when new technology emerges it is often very expensive to manufacture.




### Colorimetric inks for "smart tattoos"

In Munich, Dr. Ali Yetison and team tested inks on pig skin that responded to glucose, pH and albumin protein (albumin irregularities can indicate liver or kidney failure).

### Limitations:

Pigments need to shift and move in the skin. Thus far, the inks created tend to settle into a cavity. The execution hasn't been fruitful.

**The takeaway:** Conventional tattoos can save lives today with a little consciousness and are poised to save lives in the near future.



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The pigment color depends on its chemical composition and behavior of each component in the skin.

The most stable pigments for eyebrows are:



Iron oxide pigments compensated with chromium oxide.



Hybrids with two types of black colors: carbon black and iron oxide black.



Organic black/red/yellow/white pigments compensated with additional warm colors.



"No-black" organic pigments, which are made of red/green or orange/blue mixes, for example.
