ATTENTION: Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza

Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI), H5N1, has been confirmed in the United States in 2022. Introduced by migrating wild birds, H5N1 will spread through spring migration, and can affect <u>all</u> domestic poultry: small and urban flocks and commercial industries.



Poultry with HPAI do not survive the illness. Vaccines for HPAI are not readily available.

Signs of Avian Influenza

- Extreme depression
- Very quiet
- Difficulty breathing
- Decrease in feed or water intake
- Swelling or purple discoloration of head, eyelids, comb, wattle, and hocks
- Decrease in egg production
- Sudden unexplained death

Biosecurity is your best option to prevent HPAI from entering your small or urban poultry flock.
