


# "kuchinate chained"


# letter from the directors

# 2021 in numbers



Throughout 2021, Kuchinate supported over 300 vulnerable asylum-seeking women and their families, equating to over 1,000 beneficiaries.



We are proud to report that the growth of Kuchinate allowed us to employ ten asylum-seeking community managers throughout the year. The roles include shop management, quality control and production, childcare, translation, community relations and support.



The work we do at Kuchinate would not be possible without the assistance and dedication of our large group of volunteers, who take time out of their own lives to come and significantly support the women of Kuchinate. A huge thanks to each and every one of you!



We are proud to report that this year, over 109 asylum-seeking women received salaries from Kuchinate that enabled them to support their families in dignity.

# 50 women graduated from basic sewing training

In 2021, Kuchinate taught and certified 50 of our women to sew. Our sewing courses are taught by community sewing managers of the collective alongside a few dedicated volunteers. By sewing, the women financially benefit and develop self-sufficiency skills and experience joy and emotional growth through the designing of high quality arts and crafts.



# our firsts

# two levels of computer courses-digital literacy finished by managers

Kuchinate's ten community managers participated and completed computer and digital literacy courses gaining skills ranging from managing email accounts to working with Microsoft Excel. The managers are now more active, fully qualified, and confident to accept greater responsibilities and contribute where computer literacy is needed. Professionalism and efficiency at Kuchinate have increased exponentially, and the managers are feeling more empowered with the new set of transferable skills they possess.



## participated in the World Hope Forum

We are proud to have taken part in this years World Hope Forum, where our Co-Director and Co-Founder, Dr. Diddy Mymin Kahn, spoke about Kuchinate and our mission to empower African asylum-seeking women living in Israel. The World Hope Forum's main goal is to create a global, holistic platform to counterbalance those neglects in production chains and services. This forum was dedicated to the creative power to transform society from within.



# first ever crowdfunding campaign

This year we grew our circle of support by successfully running our first online crowdfunding campaign, and raised over 750,000 NIS in a matter of 72 hours, with over 100 ambassadors, and 2,000 donors from across the world. Each one of you has helped pave the road toward a brighter future for the Kuchinate women. We look forward to showing you over the course of the next year how big of an impact you made with your donation.



### 2 new stores opened in Tel Aviv

In March 2021, Kuchinate opened a new storefront on Shabazi Street, a luxury shopping area in Tel Aviv. Shabazi Street had never seen African pride fair trade items on display, but we have been well received by the public. With the success of the first storefront, we also opened a second pop-up shop in a mall in the center of Tel Aviv. Opening of stores allows for our women to connect with the public and get their stories out into the world. Stores are also a gateway for our women to develop new managerial and sales skills.



# psychosocial empowerment

As an arts based resilience project, Kuchinate's ultimate goal is the wellbeing and mental health of the beneficiaries; this is felt at every level of Kuchinate, through crafting, making art, advocacy, teaching, learning, designing, selling, etc. Kuchinate's unique holistic approach was developed to combine resilience building and the therapeutic benefits of handiwork within an open and culturally supportive environment. To date, hundreds of asylum-seeking women have been assisted in coping with their traumas, building resilience through art, finding community, increasing stability, learning marketable skills, and making a living in dignity.

# In 2021

- 4 social work students assisted the psychosocial team in home visits and case management, greatly advancing our reach and ability to assist more women.
- Over 300 women received psychosocial support which is available on an ongoing basis
- We continued to provide emergency support due to the stressors of the pandemic. This included continuing information on health and vaccination guidelines, distribution of medical and basic needs, food vouchers, and material for the women to work from home.



# economic empowerment

Economic self-sufficiency is an essential and basic need that has to be addressed in order to give the women the emotional availability to address their past and present issues.

To further economic empowerment, all women of the collective enjoy free childcare so they can focus on improving new skills and generate additional economic security for themselves and their families.

Workshops, coffee (buna) ceremonies, and events held in the workshop throughout 2021 remained important sources of economic empowerment for the women. While the pandemic closed our doors to many international visitors, we were blessed to have dozens of Israeli and expat groups who came to visit, hear the stories of the women, and buy our products.

These interactions have resulted in the women advocating and achieving positive change and growth.

Kuchinate was invited to home sales across the country this year where our message was broadcasted to new communities. Hundreds of people had the opportunity to purchase Kuchinate handiworks, hear the women's stories, and interact with a community that they normally might not have the opportunity to.

# crochet

This year, Kuchinate grew its crochet collection to include new and innovative designs for our crocheted products that have sold for 9 years. We repurposed baskets into hanging plant holders and launched our crochet telephone bags. We also launched two new crocheted basket collections: Italy and Milan.

These new products generate a new source of income for the women, practice resourcefulness, and work to make Kuchinate a more earth-friendly and sustainable organization. Each collection was skillfully designed and brought to life by the women of Kuchinate alongside dedicated volunteers.

# art collaborations / installations

### City Garden Mall Public Art Installation

In collaboration with crochet artist Liza Mamali, the women of Kuchinate crocheted long pieces of string for weeks which came together for an art piece titled "The Connecting String." The piece stretches down over two floors next to our storefront in City Garden mall in the center of Tel Aviv. "The Connecting String" not only brings pride to Kuchinate, but it is also a conversation starter about Israel's asylum seekers that drapes in the popular mall. The mall includes the collaborative project with Gil Yefman entitled "Body of Work" and showcases lifesize baskets that tell the stories of a handful of Kuchinate women. These collaborative pieces demonstrate the interconnectedness between the Israeli population and the asylum-seeking community.



### 3x3 active gallery

Portraits of six Kuchinate women were proudly displayed on Allenby Street in Tel Aviv, a main street in the center of the city. Six leading Israeli photographers, Michal Chelbin, Dafy Hagai, Hanna Sahar, Naama Klaiman Shahar, Ella Barak, and Rotem Lebel, took portraits of Kuchinate women in their homes and with their children, bringing awareness to the plight of asylum seeking women on the weeks leading up to and after International Women's Day.





### Poland film festival

This year, Kuchinate was contacted by Facebook Poland and the Papaya Young Film Festival, asking if we would agree to be the subject of their films that focused on the empowerment of women. Our marketing director traveled to Warsaw for the screening, and the film created about Kuchinate won "Best Animated Video"! Thousands of Poles were in attendance and we were proud to take part in such a large and well-known film festival and have the opportunity to advocate for the Kuchinate women.



We donated 100 of our beautiful handmade baskets to the annual Tel Aviv Rape Crisis Center Bazaar to sell and raise money for the Center in support of our larger community.

### 50+ groups visited despite Covid

Despite the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, we were proud to host over 50 groups for coffee ceremonies, lunch, and crochet workshops when the regulations permitted. We hosted groups from hi-tech companies in Israel, high school and university students, medical students, diplomats, professors of culture and African studies, among others. Our women proudly shared their culture, customs, and stories of both hardship and resilience, especially during the uncertain times of the pandemic.

### We took part and spoke at International Day to End Violence

This year, the Kuchinate women proudly marched alongside hundreds of others and stood on stage before the crowd demanding an end to violence against women on the International Day to End Violence Against Women.



### **Special visits**

This year, we were humbled to welcome hundreds of visitors into our studio to meet the Kuchinate women and hear their stories of resilience and strength. Some of these unique visitors included His Beatitude Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Patriarch of Jerusalem, and the Ambassador to Sweden. They all enjoyed a traditional Eritrean coffee ceremony while hearing about the plight of asylum seekers in Israel.

### Goodbyes

The opportunity for resettlement is extremely rare, but offers a glimmer of hope for the women. This year, two of the Kuchinate women, Asmeret and Tsaga, relocated with their children to Canada amid the pandemic. It was a hard goodbye for us all, but we are thrilled to hear about their successes in Canada.

In November of this year, we also said goodbye to Sister Agnese Elli, who had been with us at Kuchinate since 2015 with the Comboni Sisters. Sister Agnese put her whole heart and soul into Kuchinate: not only was she an excellent bookkeeper, but she also spent time with children, made long-lasting and meaningful connections with her community members, and put a smile on everybody's faces. Her radiant presence will be missed, never forgotten, and we wish her the best of luck as she continues on her new path in Sri Lanka with the Comboni Sisters.
