
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
Ring Size Guide

Before measuring your ring size, ensure that this guide is printed in US Letter size (8.5" x 11") and scaled to 100%. You can check the accuracy of your print by positioning a credit card on the line below or measuring the lines underneath the credit card line. If the card or ruler lines up, you're all set.



Method 1: Measure By Matching An Existing Ring

To find your ring size, use an existing ring that fits well. Match up the inside edge of that ring with one of the circles below. If the ring falls between two sizes, we recommend choosing the larger size.



Method 2: Measure With A Paper Ring Sizer

Cut out the ring sizer below and carefully cut along the vertical line to create a slit. Wrap the sizer around the base of your finger and pull the tapered end through the slit. To ensure that the ring will fit comfortably, we suggest also measuring your knuckle. We recommend selecting a size that will be easy to get on and off your finger.

Ring size may vary slightly depending on the style of the ring. Wider bands will feel like a tighter fit than thinner bands, even at the same size. We hope this guide will help, but cannot guarantee that sizing via the paper ring sizer will be accurate. We recommend getting sized in person by a local jeweler for the best fit.
