

Frets


Head Bridge Sound Hole

String Names On the Ukulele



- is the top string, closest to your nose.
 - (c) is the next string, fat and low.
 - ϵ comes after, count '1, 2, 3' and
- A is the bottom string, next to your knee.




NOW LETS ALL PLAY G CE A!



This simple song will help you remember the names of the strings on your ukulele!

Sing the words to the same notes that you play.





FLICK THAT FLEA!




This song teaches you about the strings of your ukulele and how to pluck them.

Imagine that a tiny flea has landed on your first string, the G string. Now gently flick your thumb across the G string to shoo the flea away!

Follow the flea down your ukulele as it jumps from one string to the next. You can sing the words below the notes.

Sing the same notes that you play.

Rest for one beat (or Sh!) when you see a crotchet rest \$





THE BIG SHIP SAILS



In this song we are strumming, which means playing all the strings at once with a single brush of your thumb.

Strum down with your thumb when you see this arrow

To help you sing along, strum on the words in **bold**.

Don't forget the actions. Remember to use your strumming hand!

Fun Actions To Try

On 'ally-ally-o' move your hand like a wave.

On 'never, ever do ' wag your finger, side to side.

On 'bottom of the sea' point to the floor.

On 'last day of September', salute like a sailor!


C MAJOR CHORD POSITION



A chord is when we play **2 or more notes at the same time**, usually by **strumming** .

This is the chord of **C major**, which is played by holding down the **A string on the 3**rd **fret** then **strumming all the strings** at once.

When we do this, instead of playing the open strings **G C E** and **A**, we are playing **G C E** and another, higher, **C**.




Top Tips!

- The high C on the A string should sound out clearly. If the A string makes a 'thunk' noise, you need to press down a little harder.
- Try not to strangle your ukulele! Keep your wrist down and support the back of your ukulele with your thumb.



THE BIG SHIP SAILS





Now we are going to play this song using the chord **C major**. The C major position looks like this.


Holding down the C major position, strum down with your thumb when you see this arrow



- Tapping your knee on the word "knee






Now it's time to learn to read musical notes!

Say hello to the stave - six lines that music notes live on.


Where do the notes live on the stave?

Why not compose your very first 5-note song using the notes G, C, E, A? Once you have composed your song, try and play it!











Now let's play this song from full musical notation!


To help you, you have the notes written as letters too.
