Sample Question Paper-1

English Paper-2 (Literature)

Section-A

Answer 1

(i) Option (D) is correct.

Explanation: Option (a) is the third vision. Option (b) happens when the girl strikes the match the fourth and last time. Option (c) is not mentioned in the story. Option (d) happens when the girl strikes the match the second time when she sees a well laid table with a roasted goose stood with apples. Her feverish imagination makes her see the goose waddling towards her with carving knife and fork in its back.

(ii) Option (B) is correct.

Explanation: Although the narrow cage (a) restricts her view making the bird stalk in it, it is the rage that follows that blinds him. Option (b) is right as the poet makes it clear in the third and fourth line of the second stanza, he 'can seldom see through his bars of rage'. Besides, 'blinded by rage' is a widely used metaphor to denote the frustration and anger of the suppressed. Options (c) and (d) do not match.

(iii) Option (C) is correct.

Explanation: (c) (flower) is the right option, because Margot has written in her poem, 'I think the sun is a flower/ That blooms for just one hour'. Option (d) shows what they read about sun in the class and how like a lemon it was. Options (a) and (b) are not relevant in the context.

(iv) Option (A) is correct.

Explanation: The question requires an answer that is not true of Sibia. Option (a) says that Sibia had golden hair while actually her hair was as black as ebony. All the other three options are true in her case.

(v) Option (A) is correct.

Explanation: The poem begins with the line 'The athletes have come from so many countries /To run for the gold, for the silver and bronze' which proves that it is an international sporting event. The other options can happen in any sporting event.

(vi) Option (C) is correct.

Explanation: Under wraps is figurative expression to denote a well guarded secret. By revealing at the last moment about his star candidate, Hitler wanted to spring a surprise to unnerve other athletes. The other options seem ridiculous as no one needs to wrap an athlete in blanket, gift wrapped or underneath a wrap.

(vii) Option (B) is correct.

Explanation: The patriot got a rousing welcome when he came victorious after the war. So option (a) cannot be right. Getting wet in the rain cannot make a soldier sad. He church spires flamed with flags in honour of the soldier, So that cannot make him sad. It is how the attitude of the fans changed the next year branding him as a traitor that gripped him with sadness. Option (b) shows the fickle attitude of the fans, so is the correct answer.

(viii) Option (D) is correct.

Explanation: The writer introduces Thompson as the wheelright who takes care of the crippled child. The other answers are not correct.

(ix) Option (D) is correct.

Explanation: Abou Ben saw not a fairy but an angel from heaven writing in a book of gold. So (d) is the right answer. (b) and (c) are wrong because the angel was not sitting on the bed.

(x) Option (A) is correct.

Explanation: The poem is titled Daffodils as it is all bout the lingering joy the poet feltin seeing a field of daffodils. (b) is not correct as he compares the daffodils to stars. The waves were outdone by the flowers; so option (c) is also not correct.

(xi) Option (C) is correct.

Explanation: Shylock feels betrayed by his daughter who ran away with a Christian. He does not feel proud, nor envy and is not at all filled with remorse. He feels his own flesh betrayed him; so option (c) is right.

(xii) Option (D) is correct.

Explanation: Bassanio interpreted the messages on the caskets in the right manner. He was not enamoured by appearance; nor was he greedy for money. So (d) is right.

(xiii) Option (B) is correct.

Explanation: This was said by Shylock to the lawyer Portia. He feels law is on his side as he is justified in making the demand. The other character do not say these words.

(xiv) Option (D) is correct.

Explanation: Antonio is not scared, angry or jealous. He accepts his fate. The word resigned is the best way to describe his mentality. So option (d) is correct.

(xv) Option (A) is correct.

Explanation: It is clear from the conversation that Nerissa is angry with Gratia no for giving the ring she gifted him to someone else. It is not the other way round. She is not angry because he left her on the day of marriage. Gratiano has no problem with her going with Portia. So, option (a) is right.

(xvi) Option (B) is correct.

Explanation: Lorenzo clearly says he recognised her by the sound of her voice. The other options are not correct.

Section-B

Answer 2

- (i) He is Antonio, the Merchant of Venice.
 - Shylock wants a pound of flesh from Antonio.
 - Shylock wants Antonio's flesh just to take revenge by inflicting pain on him. He has no use for the flesh, so he intends to feed the fish with it; revenge is his aim and he would feed his ego by hurting the person who had insulted him at Rialto
- (ii) According to Shylock, Antonio had insulted him and prevented him from making profit through usury; by not taking interest for the money lent, he had instigated people to withdraw their friendship towards the Jew, and increased the number of his enemies by talking against him. More importantly, Shylock claims Antonio had wounded his pride by scorning his Nation.
- (iii) Shylock furnishes many points to prove the similarity between a jew and a Christian. They are similar in makeup, senses and emotions. They eat alike, are hurt by the same weapons, feel the impacts of the seasons in the same way. Both bleed when they are wounded, die when they are poisoned. They are prone to be affected by same diseases, and healed in the same way.
- (iv) Shylock argues when a Jew offends a Christian, the Christian's reaction is revenge. So, if a Christian offends a Jew, he will follow this example of the Christian by taking revenge.
- (v) The two distinct emotions Shylock feels is a thirst for revenge and anger. He appears as the most callous and revengeful person when he demands a pound of Antonio's flesh. We hate him when he suggests he does not want the forfeit in money but in the form of Antonio's life. However, in some ways, his anger is justified because he has been wronged in many ways; insult against his self, his nation, betrayal by his own daughter, all these make him angry which in turn, whets his outrage which can be satisfied only by harming Antonio, a Christian.

Answer 3

- (i) Portia is in a Court of Justice at Venice. She is here to save her husband's friend Antonio by defending him from Shylock's unfair demand. Bassanio does not recognise his wife because she is dressed in the male attire of doctor of law.
- (ii) The quality of mercy is comp<mark>ared to the</mark> gentle rain from heaven. This should rain naturally from human heart suffusing the world with its divine quality. It comes as a blessing to the one who receives it as well as the one who shows it as there is plenty of joy and satisfaction in forgiveness.
- (iii) Mercy is the mightiest of the mightiest because its power is mightier than all the other powers that a king can boast of. The throne, the crown and the scepter are all symbols of power of the king. Mercy looks better in a king than his crown. Portia says that the person who grants mercy is equally blessed as the one who receives it. This is because mercy is a divine attribute, and the person who grants it is embodying godliness.
- (iv) Sceptre is insignia of the kingly power, a symbolic rod of kingship. It represents authority and fear that a king generates in others. However, mercy is higher and most divine as it is a godly quality which is superior to any worldly authority. It suits the monarch more than a crown or any other sign of power.
- (v) These words are addressed to Shylock the Jew, who makes unfair demand of Antonio's flesh. Shylock is surprised at Portia's plea for mercy. According to him the law is on his side; Antonio failed to return the borrowed amount in time and is entitled to the agreed punishment. However, Portia cleverly beats him at his own game, and we admire her ingenuity with which she brings up the clause of not shedding any blood. Another quality of hers worthy of a heroine is her deep love for her husband and commitment to justice, which makes her come all the way to save his bosom friend.

Answer 4

All the revelry gone, they braced themselves to brave another spell of rain and gloom. At that time, they remembered Margot whom they had shut up in a closet, just because she seemed different from them. Now, all she said about the sun proved true. Remorse struck as they moved towards the closet to set Margot free. They were ashamed of themselves and could not look at each other.

Answer 5

- (i) She was the little match girl of the story by the same name. That she was poor was evident as she walked bareheaded and barefoot in that freezing cold night. She was a picture of misery as she crept along shivering and hungry with unsold packets of matches.
- (ii) It was the coldest evening of the dying year-the New Year's Eve. She did not dare to go home as she would be cuffed by her father for not being able to sell the matches and earn any money. Moreover, it would not have made any difference as the wind whistling through the broken roof of their home made it so cold and unwelcome.
- (iii) The little girl lighted the matches to warm her numb fingers. Later, she could see pleasant visions in their warm glow. When she lit the first match, it seemed to spread a strange light. She felt she was sitting in front of a great iron stove with polished brass knobs and ornaments. She felt warm and cosy.
- (iv) The little girl loved her late grandmother so dearly. When the vision of this beloved person appeared, the girl requested her to take her away to the place where she lived.
- (v) The little match girl was frozen to death. On the one hand, it can be considered a happy ending to the misery of the girl. It is preferable to leave this world which is callous and indifferent to a lone, poor girl who dies of bitter cold and hunger and lack of shelter on a New Year's Eve. On the other hand, it is sad that people in the midst of their celebration are not aware or bothered about the misery of the have-nots. The plight of the girl haunts our memory long after we finish reading the account.

Answer 6

- (i) Abou Ben Adam woke up to the sight of moonlight filling his room with glorious glow and looking like a lily in bloom, an angel writing in a book of gold.
- (ii) Abou asked what the angel was writing in the golden book. He got the reply that the names of those who love the Lord were being written.
- (iii) When he came to know that his name did not appear in the list of those who loved the Lord, Abou was not overly disappointed as he was calm by nature and had equanimity of mind. He was bold and straightforward as he conversed with the angel. He humbly asked the angel to write his name as one who loved his fellowmen and this portrays him as a selfless being whose heart resonated with love for his fellow beings. In other words, he considered serving humanity equal to serving God.
- (iv) The angel appeared to him in the following night with a 'great awakening light'. He showed the names of those whom God had blessed, and leading the list was the name of Abou.
- (v) The poet believes more people like Abou are the need of the hour. The world requires those who selflessly work for the betterment of society; they rank above those who just worship God. God himself is happy with people like Abou and considers them superior. The central message of the poem is love of fellow beings is the real love of God; without it, loving God is just a show.
- 7. (i) As the banner said, they were special children who were participating in 'Special Olympiad'.
