English Paper-1 (Language)

1. (i) Every child loves visiting his grandparents' house. I am no different. My grandparents stay in Ajmer, Rajasthan. Every year, I visit Ajmer during the summer vacations. Last year, too, I went there full of expectations of discovering something new.

Ajmer is an important city in Rajasthan. The amalgamation of Hindu and Islamic culture in the city make it the best example of unity in diversity. It is iconic for the presence of the Dargah of Saint Muin-ud-din Chishti and Soni Ji Ki Nasiya Jain Temple. The local people respect all religions and celebrate festivals together.

Last year, I was lucky because the festival of Urs clashed with my visit there. Urs is the commemoration of the death of Saint Muin-ud-din Chishti. It continues for six days and is marked with different activities for each day.

My grandfather is a great believer of Saint Muin-ud-din Chishti. Hence, we decided to visit the Dargah for all six days. Right after twilight, the qawwali session would start and continue till the early hours of morning. Most people were dressed in traditional kurta salwar and covered their heads with a skull cap or a handkerchief. Ladies too covered their heads with a scarf or wore a burqa. Unsurprisingly, there were many devotees here who were not Muslims. They too paid their respects to the saint.

There were many mouth-watering delicacies near the Dargah including soan halwa, kadi kachori, gajak and a variety of kebabs and chaats. We tried each one of them. The Dargah Mujawar i.e. guardians distributed sheerini which was similar to sweet balls. On the sixth day of the Urs, called 'Chati Sharif', there was a special program in which the khadims or servants of the Dargah recited the genealogical tree of the Chisti order. Then there was fariyad or supplication followed by Qul or conclusion. A poem of praise called badhaawa is sung by the mujawars right at the main entrance of the Dargah. After the Qul, a cannon is fired marking the end of the ceremony.

Visiting the Dargah was an enlightening experience for me. I had only heard of unity amongst Indians; however, I personally saw it when I visited the Dargah. I also felt that every culture is unique in its own way. The visit made me hungry for more such experiences. I have decided to travel all over the country exploring more such shrines as I grow up.
