* Our FDA-approved morning-after pill is a progestin-only emergency contraception that helps prevent pregnancy before it starts. EC, like Julie is 89% effective when taken within 72 hours (or 3 days) after unprotected sex.

We're changing the conversation around emergency contraception. We believe in access to sexual health, education, and community care.

Dear Julie Company,

My name is Angela and I would like to share a story with you that has made me passionate about opening the conversation of emergency contraceptives.

In high school, I was consistently having sex with a boy. After a night I spent with him, I knew I needed to get emergency contraception. Silly me, I had asked him to come with me to the store and we could split the price and the embarrassment. To my surprise and my naivety, he declined it and told me I had to go alone "because he had stuff to do". I asked him to split the price and he told me to pay for it myself.

At this point in time, I was already upset so I sat in the parking lot of [local drugstore] in my small town and cried until I got the courage to go inside.

I hid my face with a baseball hat and walked in. I grabbed a 12 pack of paper towels so I could hide the EC box behind it while waiting in line to check out. It took me 15 minutes to finally step into the aisle where the morning-after pill was.

I stood there peering behind the corner to make sure no one was coming. I grabbed it and walked to the fridge where I could get a view of the line to check out. To my luck, there was a boy in my grade, a friend's mom and 5 other people.

I turned my body towards the refrigerator and started to hysterically cry.

A woman with dark hair in her 20s tapped me on the shoulder and took the morning-after pill out of my hands and gave me a hug without a word. 5 minutes later she came back with a paper bag and the pill. She hugged me while I cried in her arms.

She told me her name was Jane and she recently moved to the area. She pulled up her phone and showed me her lock screen. It was a picture of a little boy. She told me she was 17 years old when she got pregnant and decided to keep the child. The father of the baby removed himself from the picture.

I will not share her story as it is not mine to share but without this woman's empathy I have no idea what I would have done. She gave me her phone number and called me everyday to see how I was doing as I waited on my period. I was in a panic for a month and a half as my period came late due to side effects from the morning-after pill.

I was 16 at the time, 4 years ago and I still connect with her from time to time.

There are so many girls who have had to go through embarrassing and degrading experiences during the process of obtaining an emergency contraceptive. I am extremely passionate about reducing the shame many girls have to go through. I want to make this conversation known to all ages and genders because Jane will not always be waiting in the aisle to help girls dealing with this.





How does your organization distribute Julie?





And we made jewelry with Cheeky Bonsai & Ian Charms.



A Year In Reproductive Legislation

In a year marked by significant and often contradictory milestones in women's health and reproductive rights, it seemed fitting that 2023 began with what should have been the 50th anniversary of Roe v. Wade. Throughout 2023, the country continued to navigate the implications of the Dobbs decision which struck down the constitutional right to an abortion in 2022. The decision left states to determine their positions on abortion, with many monumental laws passed in 2023. Ohio joined other states like California and Michigan where residents voted to add abortion protection to the state constitution. Many more states added legal protection for patients and providers when seeking abortion care, including Vermont and Washington.

In the movement against access to abortion, a challenge was initiated against the original FDA approval of mifepristone (one of the drugs used in medication abortions), stating its safety and efficacy profile was misrepresented. While the Supreme Court has since backed the FDA's decision, some retailers took a preemptive and controversial stand against stocking and selling mifepristone. The legalities of authority to prescribe, mail-order prescribing, and gestational use are still being determined.


Beyond the abortion sphere, a huge victory for reproductive rights was celebrated in June when the FDA approved the first over-the-counter birth control, Opill.

At Julie we look forward to 2024, and getting one step closer to contraception access for all.

On April 29, in partnership with VOICE Amplified, Julie showed up where we wish we didn't need to, helping to build out 2,000 First Aid Rape Kits in North Carolina that were shipped to Ukraine to provide essential materials amidst the humanitarian crisis.

EC Cheat Sheet

In the comments and in our DMs, our community asked us their most pressing questions about health, sex, and the morning-after pill experience. Here are a few of our frequently asked questions.

Is there a weight limit for taking Julie?

No. Julie can be used by anyone with a uterus regardless of weight. However, for people with a BMI under 25, pregnancy risk after taking the morningafter pill is less than 2%. If your BMI is over 29.9, the risk of pregnancy increases to 5.8%.





Is emergency contraception the same thing as the abortion pill?

No, emergency contraception, or the morning-after pill and the abortion pill are two very different medications.

The medication in Julie is levonorgestrel which stops ovulation before it begins. It has no impact on an existing pregnancy. Julie and other emergency contraception pills are not an abortion pill.

What are the most common Julie side effects?

- Bleeding/spotting between periods
- Temporary changes to a period cycle (the next period comes early or late)
- Heavier or lighter next period

- Abdominal pain
- Fatigue
- Headache
- Dizziness
- Breast tenderness
