Seasons are divided into Kau (dry/ summer) and Ho'oilō (wet/ winter). Kepelino describes La'a Make (short for Lā'au Make) as a time when the seasonal plants like 'awapuhi, pia and 'ōlena die and La'a Ulu (short for Lā'au Ulu) as a time for those seasonal plants to grow again.
